# ARE MUCH IN FAVOR

NEBRASKA TAKES KINDLY TO FEDERAL LOAN BANKS

## URGES GREATER FOOD CROPS

Secretary of Agriculture Says Housewives Are Wasteful in the Kitchen—State Water Law is Sustained.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.—Omaha.—Forty-nine national farm loan associations have already formed in the eight federal land bank districts and have filed their articles of association with the federal land bank of Omaha. They have applied for loans on behalf of their members, aggregating a total of \$2,424,740.

Nebraska leads the list with twenty-six associations, already formed, applying for a grand total of \$1,369,160. South Dakota, with fifteen associations, asks for \$604,180, and Wyoming, with six associations, wants \$335,900. Iowa's two associations ask \$115,800.

### State Water Law Sustained

Washington.—Disposing of irrigation water rights in the North Platte river valley in Nebraska worth more than \$2,000,000, a Nebraska supreme court ruling upholding the validity of the state's water law of 1895 and sustaining the water claims of the Tri-State Land and Farmers' Mutual Canal companies has been put into effect by the supreme court.

In proceedings by the Enterprise, Central and Gering Irrigation districts and various North Platte valley land and water companies to enjoin the Tri-State Land company from diverting more than twenty-eight "second feet" of water from the river, the supreme court did not decide the constitutionality of the Nebraska law of 1895 authorizing a state board to determine priority of irrigation water claims. The court dismissed the irrigation districts' appeal.

## URGES GREATER FOOD CROPS

Secretary of Agriculture Says Housewives Are Wasteful

New York.—Greater food crops and the practice of household economics are urged by Secretary of Agriculture Houston as measures to help reduce the cost of living. American families, he estimated in a statement on the food situation, waste in their kitchen annually more than \$700,000,000 worth of edibles.

There is nothing in the situation to justify hysteria, however, he declared, because there is no real shortage of food in the country.

Mr. Houston emphasized the importance of the food cost investigation directed by President Wilson and held out hope that increased acreages this year may insure greater food supplies. Wheat and potatoes, he said, were unusually short last year, but nevertheless there will be enough to supply very nearly normal needs.

The food problem cannot be solved, in the secretary's opinion, through price fixing by the federal or state governments, but by "intelligent planning and constructive action in conjunction with the operation of normal forces."

### Declare for Closure Rule.

Washington.—After more than one hundred years under rules permitting debate limited only by the physical endurance of senators and the provisions of the constitution, the senate, by a vote of seventy-six to three, has put power in the hands of two-thirds of its members in the future to limit discussion and to say when a vote shall be taken on a pending measure. The organized filibuster as recognized in the senate is dead.

Lincoln, Neb.—President Wilson has been asked to save the limited woman suffrage bill now pending in the Nebraska state senate. Telegrams were dispatched to him to ask the democrats here to do what he asked the Tennessee senate to do, that is, give the woman the ballot as they ask it. Suffrage workers have been doing their best to suppress the story. It is said, but one of their number gave it away before she thought at a local hotel dinner party.

### Investigation is Probable

Washington.—A food cost investigation by the federal trade commission still is a possibility, despite congress' failure to appropriate the \$400,000 requested for the inquiry. It has been learned that the commission now is considering whether it is practicable to undertake the inquiry on a limited scale with its present staff and without extra funds. The \$400,000 appropriation request was approved by President Wilson, who ordered the investigation and it was voted by the house, but turned down by the senate.

Washington.—American shipbuilders engaged on government work have entered into an agreement to accept new contracts at a flat rate of 10 per cent net profit, and pledged co-operation in rushing to completion the navy's construction program. Virtually all of the larger private plants in the country were represented in the conference. The builders said they were willing to turn to government contracts at 10 per cent as a patriotic duty, and the secretary on his part agreed to protect them from undue loss.

### Actual Bullion Value.

The United States realizes the difference between the actual bullion value of the gold or silver in the coins it issues and the money value it places on them by coinage and by its stamp of approval. The gold and silver coins issued by the government are not pure gold or silver, but are alloyed with copper to the extent of making them 900 parts fine, as required by law. If made of pure gold or silver they would be too soft and the copper alloy of 100 parts in 1,000 is for the purpose of hardening them. The difference between the nominal or face value of a coin and its bullion value at the moment of coining represents a profit to the government which is supposed to cover the cost of coining.

# WITH MOUNTED GUNS

NAVY DEPARTMENT TO OUTFIT MERCHANT CRAFT

## UPHOLDS COURSE OF ACTION

Foreign Secretary Says the Proceedings Were Natural, and in Accord With Modern Warfare Methods

Washington.—Lacking legal authority to establish general censorship, the administration has appealed to the patriotism of the country's newspapers and cable companies to suppress information about the movements of American merchant craft, now to be armed against German submarines.

"The best news that readers can have," said Secretary Daniels in a formal statement, "is that the government will protect the rights of Americans to the freedom of the seas. The publication of details can serve no good purpose and might jeopardize human life."

Mr. Daniels had determined not to reveal any of the department's plans for carrying out the policy ordered by President Wilson. He previously has stated, however, that the navy is prepared with guns, ammunition and gun crews to carry out the instructions.

### Says War Depends on Wilson.

"I do not know; it depends on President Wilson," said a Budapest newspaper representative of a Budapest newspaper whether war between the United States and Germany was expected the German foreign secretary, Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, as quoted in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen, replied:

"I do not know it depends on President Wilson. Since the severance of diplomatic relations we have been without official information from America, but I can say this: 'We shall prosecute the submarine war with all means at our disposal.'"

### DEFENDS GERMANY'S COURSE

Dr. Zimmermann Says It Was Perfectly Natural and Rational

London.—The German government's plan for involving Mexico and Japan in war with the United States in event of hostilities between Germany and America, was defended in an address before the reichstag by the foreign secretary, Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, as quoted in a Reuter dispatch from Amsterdam. Replying to objections raised by a socialist member to the Mexican proposals, Dr. Zimmermann said:

"We were looking out for all of us in the event of there being a prospect of war with America. It was a natural and justified precaution, I am not sorry that, through its publication in America, it also became known in Japan."

"For the dispatch of these instructions a secure way was chosen which at present is at Germany's disposal. How the Americans came into possession of the text which went to America in special secret code we do not know."

New York.—Evidence designed to show that Dr. Chandre Chakraberty, a Hindu physician, and Ernest S. Ekunna, a German chemist, received more than \$60,000 from Wolf von Igel, a member of the staff of Count von Bernstorff, former German ambassador in the United States upon the order of Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, German foreign minister with which to foment a rebellion in India, is reported to have been presented to a special federal grand jury here.

London.—A dispatch from Berlin says Americans and others, who were on board the captured British steamer Yarrowdale, have left Germany. The Spanish American and Brazilian Yarrowdale prisoners were sent from the prisoner's camp at Brandenburg to Switzerland by way of Liden. Members of other neutral crews were sent home through various frontier towns. The dispatch says that the prisoners were released on the expiration of the quarantine imposed by the discovery of a case of spotted fever.

### Small Hope of Averting Break

Washington.—Austria's note declaring adhesion to the general principles of unrestricted submarine warfare holds out little, if any hope, that a break between the United States and the Vienna governments may be avoided.

Austria's efforts to substitute for the individual warning every merchantship is entitled by international law to receive before being torpedoed a general warning to all vessels not to enter barred zones cannot be accepted by this government.

### Must Not Publish Revelations.

London.—The German press has been ordered not to publish a word regarding the American Mexican revelations until further notice, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

The dispatch says that only a few circles are aware of the intrigue and that it is considered possible the result of the affair will be the resignation of Foreign Secretary Zimmermann and the ending of Count von Bernstorff's career as a diplomat.
