Corn Raising For Boys

Boys who wish to raise corn under the direction of experts at the University of Nebraska may do so by enrolling as members of the Nebraska Boys and Girls Club conducted by the university agricultural extension service.

Membership in this club is confined to boys between 10 and 18 years of age. The extension service provides information about corn growing, record book, report blanks, etc., that are necessary to carry on the work.

Each boy or girl who finishes the work of this project, no matter how great or how small the yield of corn may be, receives a Certificate of Achievement, which may be accepted in lieu of school work. Besides this, the youngster who wins the championship of his county (this applies to 50 counties only) receives a free trip to the State Club Congress. Further information may be had upon application to the Extension Service, University Farm, Lincoln.
