Defendants File Answer

An answer has been filed in district court in the case of E. Boyd Smith vs. J. H. Baber and fifty-one other citizens of Red Cloud, in which plaintiff asks judgment for \$20,000. He claimed that at the request of defendants and the city government he sunk wells which were connected with the wells of the Red Cloud water department in such a manner as to supply a sufficient amount of water for the municipality. For this the city and the defendant citizens were to pay \$1 per day for an indefinite period. This was in 1911 and payments were discontinued in 1914. Plaintiff therefore sought \$20,000 damages. The defendants allege in their answer that plaintiff was to supply 200,000 gallons of water per day and that never more than 50,000 gallons was supplied and that not in time to be of any use. The project was then abandoned and plaintiff and his partner left Red Cloud. Payments which they might have coming from the city were assigned to creditors and those were kept up until those creditors were paid, after which they were discontinued. A mortgage was foreclosed on the land on which the wells were located and neither plaintiff nor the city has any interest in the same. Tuesday's State Journal.
