In this morning's World Herald the following statement was made by Senator C. E. Samuelson in regard to his opposition on the first prohibition bill which was introduced in the house of representatives and after several amendments were made by the Senate it now has became a law.

"An examination of the house bill and the senate committee amendments discloses that this body has done its full duty. The house bill was hastily drawn-imperfect in its provisions, uncertain in its definitions, extreme in its regulations, and in some things silly and senseless.
