

# Fewer Eggs are required with ROYAL BAKING POWDER

### Chocolate Sponge Roll

1 1/4 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
2 squares melted chocolate

2 tablespoons melted shortening  
1/4 cup hot water  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

The old method called for 4 eggs and no baking powder

**DIRECTIONS**—Sift flour, baking powder and salt together three times. Beat whole eggs. Add slowly sugar, then boiling water slowly; add next vanilla, melted chocolate and melted shortening, without beating. Sift in dry ingredients, and fold in as lightly as possible. Pour into large baking pan lined with oiled paper, and bake in slow oven twenty minutes. When done, turn out on a damp, hot cloth, spread with white icing and roll.

### Comes to Senator's Rescue

There has been considerable fault finding with Senator Samuelson's position on the prohibition amendment and as was to have been expected it comes largely from those who were most pronounced in their opposition to his election last fall. It is usually this class who are most prolific with their petitions and telegrams and who are always ready to find fault with any act of a public official which does not meet with their approval. Senator Samuelson may have promised to vote for a law to enforce a prohibition amendment but the people of Nebraska did not vote upon any such law as that promulgated by the house of representatives and if they had it would be a safe bet that the majority of twenty-five thousand would have been reversed. The leaders in the fight for prohibition only asked for the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of booze without restricting the rights of the individual and such a law would have met with but little opposition in either branch of the legislature. Therefore the first evidence of bad faith came from the dry advocates. Senator Samuelson was ready and willing to vote for the kind of law the people voted for but is not to be censured for voting against any such law as that advocated by the radical dry element after a victory secured by advocating something entirely different. Politically we have nothing in common with Senator Samuelson but the criticism heaped upon him from certain quarters is unfair to him and mighty poor politics. We believe in fair play and giving the devil his dues and after a careful review of Senator Samuelson's position on different questions we are unable to find any grievous fault with his official acts.—Hildreth Telescope.

We are pleased to note the stand that Bro.
