Council Proceedings

On Tuesday morning the City Council held a special meeting with Mayor Damerell presiding and the following Councilmen were present: Koontz, Hamilton, Saladen and Stevens.

The Mayor made the following appointments for the ensuing year:

Guy Zeigler, Light, Water and Sewer Commissioner at a salary of \$140 per month and allowed extra help when needed.

P. H. Boner, City Marshal and Night Watch at a salary of \$65 per month.

Dr. Henry Cook, Health Physician.

Street Commissioner to be left to the Advisory Committee to settle.

A motion was made by Hamilton and seconded by Stevens that the City Clerk and City Treasurer pay all freight bills, express charges, telephone bills, postage, labor bills and other items of expense when approved by the proper officers. Motion carried.

Bond of S. E. Florence, City Treasurer, for \$10,000 was read and approved.

Bond of J. A. Burden, \$500, as Police Judge was read and approved.

Bond of O. C. Teel, \$500, as City Clerk was read and approved.

Oath of Geo. H. Overing as City Engineer was read and ordered filed.

Application of Powell Bros., for license to conduct a Billiard and Pool Parlor and Bowling Alley for year 1917 with fee of \$50 attached was presented.

Application of J. W. Gilbert for license to conduct a Billiard and Pool Parlor for the year 1917 with receipt for \$50 attached was presented.

Moved by Koontz and seconded by Hamilton that license be granted both parties for the municipal year ending the last Tuesday in April 1918. Motion carried.

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Guide Rock Asks for Depot

The people of Guide Rock have asked the state railway commission to see what it can do to get the Burlington to build a new depot at its station in that town. The Burlington answered by saying it had made provision for moving the depot to a better location and to enlarge it and put in tile floors and other improvements. This does not suit the business men. They desire nothing less than a new depot. The commission has informed them they must file a formal complaint and in that case a hearing will be held. Thursday's State Journal.

High School Needs Victrola

The high school chorus will offer "Bo's'n's Bride," an operetta, at the Orpheum on Friday evening, April 27th at 8 p. m. Special orchestra music will be rendered by Prof. LeRoy's orchestra. Prof. Whitehead states that the schools are in need of a good Victrola or Vocalion and takes this means of securing the funds necessary for the purchase of the same, thinking that it would more favorably impress the people than would the passing of a subscription paper. One quarter of a dollar will admit you to this entertainment.

Answers Presidents Call

The call of our president for volunteers is being heeded by the various cities throughout the state. The Franklin County Tribune states that Franklin County is going to have a company of volunteers. In the one week just passed fifteen signers have been secured and many others are making preparations to offer their services.

What is Webster county going to do? Are we going to let the call go by unheeded? Webster county has never yet played "second fiddle" in any other matter pertaining to the welfare of the community. Are we going to let this opportunity pass, to keep up our good record?

Think it over, boys. Don't wait until the time comes when you will be compelled to go. If you have no one that is absolutely dependant upon you, remember Uncle Sam needs you.

Will Vote At Next Election

The women of Nebraska are now feeling jubilant over the fact that they will now be permitted to vote, as on Saturday, April 21 Governor Neville signed H. R. 232, which gives them the right to vote on all offices and propositions not covered by the Constitution. This bill will take effect three months after the legislature adjourns.

This means that all women may vote for all city officers, all county officers except county judge, for president and vice president. They may also hold these offices. They are not permitted to vote for any judicial officers, from justice of the peace up, state officers, United States senators and representatives.

No "sweet sixteen" will go at the polls on election day, as section 1940 sets forth that they must be 21 years of age or over. They must also have resided in the state six months, in the county forty days and the township or ward ten days and must have conformed to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization. Separate ballots and ballot boxes shall be provided female electors, their ballots shall be counted and canvassed in the same manner as those of male electors.

Coal Will be Under Cover

The Malone-Gellatly Company, enterprising lumber and coal merchants of our city are making extensive improvements in their "back yard." A high board fence is being erected which will enclose the entire yard, and they are also constructing a series of new coal sheds facing Cedar street, which when completed will be modern in every way. A number of out buildings which have seen many years of service will be removed. These improvements will not only add to the beauty of the premises but will also facilitate the handling of their merchandise.

Enlarge Their Quarters

Owing to the steady increase in their business the firm of Hall & Fulton have been compelled to re-arrange their business block on Fourth avenue. The blacksmith department has now become a thing of the past. This portion of the building has been remodelled and a concrete floor placed in the same. It will be used as a repair shop, thus enabling them to use the other half of the building as a garage and sales room.

Dorsey May Be Judge

At the state house it is reported that Governor Neville will appoint Representative W. C. Dorsey of Franklin county judge of the Tenth judicial district. Representative Dorsey lives at Bloomington. He is a republican and has long been prominent in political activities in his district. It is said the matter was being so arranged that the new judge will appoint as his court reporter, Mr. Stowe, at present stenographer for Chief Justice A. W. Morrissey of the supreme court.

The present legislature passed an act giving the Tenth district and the Third district an additional judge. Governor Neville appointed a democrat in the Third district, comprising Lancaster county, and it is said he will appoint a republican in the tenth.—Monday's State Journal.
