
Vern Henderson was in Hastings, Thursday, where he enlisted in the army. He will not be able to go for a few weeks on account of his wrist not being entirely mended.

SECTION 1.—That paving District No. 1, of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska, be and the same is hereby created; that said paving district shall include all that portion of Webster street lying between the north line of Second avenue and the south line of Sixth avenue, all that portion of Third avenue lying between the west line of Webster Street and the west line of the alley west of Webster Street, all that portion of Fourth Avenue lying between the west line of Elm Street and the east line of Cedar Street, in said City and the following described real estate benefitted, to-wit:—

Lots 13 to 24 inclusive, Block 30, Original town, now City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Lots 1 to 6 inclusive and lots 12 to 23 inclusive, Block 31, Original town, now City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Lots 1 to 6 inclusive, Block 1, Williams Addition to the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Lots 1 to 12 inclusive, Block 4, Original town, now City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Lots 1 to 12 inclusive, Block 3, Original town, now City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Lots 1 to 12 inclusive, Block 6, Original town, now City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Lots 1 to 18 inclusive, Block 5, Original town, now City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Lots 1 to 12 inclusive and 19 to 24 inclusive, Block 26, Original town, now City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Lots 1 to 12 inclusive, Block 27, Original town, now City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

SECTION 2. That the roadways shall be paved in said district as follows:

Webster Street, 66 feet in width.

Third Avenue, 54 feet in width.

Fourth Avenue, 54 feet in width.

SECTION 3. That curbing and guttering, including outlets for storm water shall be constructed within said paving district.

SECTION 4. That plans, specifications and estimate of cost of work to be done within said paving district shall be secured by the City Council, and that following the completion of this engineering work, bids for the construction of work to be done in said paving district be obtained by advertisement as required by law.

SECTION 5. That the cost of grading, curbing, guttering and paving the street intersections and returns within said district, including all expenses incidental thereto, shall be paid for by the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska; and that the cost of grading, curbing, guttering and the paving of the street within said district, including the expenses incidental to said improvement shall be assessed against the property benefitted in said district in proportion to the benefits accruing to said property, not exceeding the cost thereof.

SECTION 6. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, be, and the same are hereby, repealed.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval, and publication, according to law.

Passed and approved this 6th day of June, 1917.
