Even Germany's armies are picked on a less stringent scale of requirements.

Here are the general requirements for the army:

Height-Not less than five feet, four inches, nor more than six feet. Weight-Not less than 128 rounds nor more than 190.

Lungs and heart must be well nigh perfect. Any heart "murmur" disqualifies. Hearing and sight n.ust be good. Color blindness is not necessarily a disqualification.

Chronic diseases or mental disorders cause rejection. Loss of fingers or toes, or an ear, are disqualifications.
