

> ISAIAH'S CALL TO SERVICE. HEROIC

LESSON TEXT-Isaiah 6 GOLDEN TEXT-Also I heard the voice of the Lord saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said L, Here am I; send me.-Isa. 6:8.

The lesson committee now turn for a third quarter's lesson to a series of studies in the Old Testament as found in II Kings, Ezra and Nehemiah. As an introduction, they have chosen this chapter in the book of Isalah.

Isalah prophesied in the latter half of Uzziah's reign, B. C. 760 and down to the early years of the reign of Manasseh about B. C. 694 (ch. 1:1). This event took place probably B. C. 755. The place was Jerusalem: the kingdom of Israel was still in existence (for 33 years longer) being utterly destroyed in B. C. 721. The name Isalah means "the salvation of Jehovah:" his wife is called "the prophetess;" two of his sons are named and his social position was high, as shown by his intimacy with kings. Isaiah lived in troublous times. He was a reformer seeking to rescue his nation from the sins growing out of their disobedience to God. He was the leading statesman of his time, the greatest of the prophets, an author, a heroic, single-minded, patriotic, fearless, undaunted man of great personal power and influence. He was a prophet of hope; he wrote out of his long life of faithfulness and fellowship with God. The book of Isalah falls into two great divisions; chapters 1-39 being chiefly historical, interspersed with songs and poems; chapters 40-66 are a collection of prophecies that have to do chiefly with the return from the Babylonian exile and the days of future glory for the kingdom of God.

I. Visions (vv. 1-4). As we have said, Isaiah prophesied in a time of great need. The prophet was very much discouraged. In this passage he locates his vision at a special time and place (ch. 1:1). Every man's great need today is a real vision of God. We are not so much in need of theories about God, as a vision of God himself. Uzziah's long reign of 52 years, in which the kingdom prospered and the king's name was spread abroad, stopped as suddenly as an earthquake, and his giory was eclipsed (see II Chron. 26:16-19). The place in which Isaiah saw his vision was the house of God. Perhaps not in the temple, but seeing the vision from the temple the prophet looks to a house not built with hands, Jehovah's own heavenly palace. Therein he saw "the Lord sitting on a throne his train filled the temple." Above it. or around it, were arranged hovering couriers and the seraphic choir. The majesty of this vision is indicated in verse two, its glory in verse three, and its power is indicated in verse four. The whole earth was filled with God's wondrous wisdom, love and power. Literally "the whole earth is full of his glory." The Hebrew word for holiness comes from a word meaning "to set apart-set a distance from." The holy Lord is not only sinless but he is sublime and absolute also. It may seem difficult to harmonize Isaiah's vision with John 1:18, yet these manifestations were one and the same, for all that saw Jesus saw God (John 14:9). King Uzziah was dead but the real king was living still, high and lifted up. The attempt to reason about him, what he must be and what he must not be, as if he were one of ourselves (Eph. 1:20, 21) is absurd. 11. Divisions (vv. 5-13). (I) The vision of the prophet (vv. 5-7). This vision brought conviction because it showed how far separated from God the prophet was. It also brought conversion in that he acknowledged himself to be unclean, himself and his surroundings to be vile. It also led to cleansing, for the king heard the voice of the prophet, removed his guilt and purged his sin. (2) The voice and proclamation from the king (vv. 8-13). The king called for a messenger (v. 8) and at once the prophet is found. Someone has said that "a task without a vision is drudgery; a vision without a task is a dream; while a task linked to a vision will move the world." Not only did the king ask for a messenger, but he gave the message which the messenger was to utter (vv. 9-12). The message was to be to his own people; it was not to be a pleasant one. Verse 13 shows us this message in prophecy. Isaiah ought to fully proclaim the truth, but the people would not understand it, and the whole effect of his proclamation would be to harden them.





Drafting of the Guardsmen will be accomplished by three executive orders.

The first draft order will be issued July 15, the second July 25, and the third August 5.

The regular army is to be sent to Europe first. The last of the units of this class which can be utilized will bld farewell to American shores at a date near at hand.

Immediately after July 1 the operation of the draft will begin.

WEEK'S SINKINGS ARE HIGH

Total of British Losses Among Worst on Record-Twenty-seven Vessels Are Destroyed.

London, June 2 .- Twenty-seven British ships of more than 1,600 tons have been sunk, according to the weekly British summary. Five British vessels under 1,600 tons also were sent to the bottom. No fishing vessels were destroyed.

Destroy 642 British Ships.

London, June 23 .- Since Germany began her ruthless submarine war on February 1, 642 British ships, with an aggregate tonnage of about 2,200,000 have been sunk, according to a compilation from official figures here.

In view of these conditions the commission recommends:

"1. That the production and distribution of coal and coke be conducted through a pool in the hands of a government agency; that the producers of various grades of fuel be paid their full cost of production, plus a uniform profit per ton (with due allowance for quality of product and efficiency of service) : and.

"2. That the transporation agencies of the United States, both rail and water, be similarly pooled and operated on government account, under the direction of the president, and that all such means of transportation be operated as a unit, the owning corporations being paid a just and fair compensation which would cover normal net profit, upkeep and betterments."

U. S. GUNNERS SINK U-BOAT

Armed Freighter Destroys German Submarine When Attacked Three Days Out From Liverpool.

An Atlantic Port, June 25 .- One or more of 19 shots which the gun crew of a United States armed freighter fired at a periscope when three days out from Liverpool on her voyage to America are believed by the crew to have reached their mark. The steamer reached an American port on Friday. The captain declared the superstructure of the submarine was "completely wrecked" by some of the shots, and he was "convinced" the submersible went to the bottom. En route to Liverpool, the steamer

was attacked by a submarine, the captain asserted. A torpedo struck her a glancing blow but did not explode. She was forced to dock for repairs, however, one of her blades having been torn away.

New York, June 25 .- The jury in the case of Owen Cattell and Charles F. Phillips, students charged with conspiracy to obstruct the operation of the selective draft law, returned a verdict of guilty in the federal court.

New Diver Chaser Success.

Washington, June 25 .- Preliminary eports from the New York navy yard on trials of the first of the 110-foot submarine chasers show satisfactory results in every respect. The hull was completed in a few weeks' time.

U. S. DESTROYER SINKS DIVER

U-Boat Rammed After German-born American Spies It-Secret Device Being Used.

Base of the American Navy Flotilla. in England, June 23 .- A German submarine was rammed and sunk by an American destroyer after a Germanborn American bluejacket had spled out the underwater craft, according to belief expressed by the crew of a certain American sea watchdog which returned to port. It was reported that a secret anti-submarine device is being used by U. S. warships.

This is the first German submarine the word of whose sinking has been received by crews of the American patrol flotilla.

Recruiting Week Proclamation

incoln, Neb .- In an endeavor to follow out the president's recruiting order. Governor Neville has issued the following proclamation:

"The period of June 23 to 30 is herewith designated as recruiting week, during which time it is earnestly urged that a sufficient number of able bodied men between the ages of eighteen and forty years enlist to bring the national guard regiments to war strength and to raise the quota assigned to Nebraska for the regular army. In determining the quota to be raised by the draft, states and counties will be given credit for all men who have enlisted in the national guard and regular army. Enlist now. Do not wait to be drafted. The longer it takes to get ready, the greater will be the price we pay.

Food Shortage Getting Worse. Copenhagen.-The American conroversy over the use of benzoate of soda is recalled by the recommendation of the German food department that this preservative be used instead of sugar, which is very scarce, in putting up fruit. Fruits largely disappeared from the open market as soon as the authorities attempted to regulate the prices and are almost unobtainable in Berlin. The potato situation bad tho it is in Berlin and other leading cities, is said to be far worse in more remote localities.

Chicago.-Every baker in the United States is to be asked to discontinue after July 10, as a measure for food conservation, the practice of taking back unsold bread from retailers. This move was announced by the war emergency council of the baking industry, meeting here. Representatives of bakers who produce 95 per cent of the bread sold in Chicago pledge themselves to give support to all patriotic measures ordered or recommended by the council of national defense, and pledged themselves specifically to discontinue taking back unsold bread.
