Spreading Canning Gospel

Lincoln, Neb., July 31.—Nebraska now has an army of 2,135 women food conservation volunteers from 247 towns at work spreading the gospel of canning, according to figures just compiled by the Extension Service of the College of Agriculture.
This town has "done its bit" in contributing to raise this army of canning demonstrators, the following being among the names on the honor roll: Gertrude L. Coon, Bertha Doyle, Edythe Herrick, Bertha Osborn, Mildred Poinicky.
Training schools to equip these recruits to act as canning demonstrators were held in 33 towns over the State. These schools resulted in the enlistment of an army of 2,135 women, each of which pledged herself to teach others to can. The schools were conducted under the auspices of the Agricultural Extension Service, instruction being given in home canning and home drying. Directions and literature for instructional work are supplied by the University.
Many women enrolled in this movement have offered to give canning demonstrations in near-by towns, provided expenses are paid. The University of Nebraska Agricultural Extension Service, University Farm, Lincoln will be glad to find teachers for any group of women desiring instruction in methods of canning or drying.
Nebraska women were not the only ones trained in these schools, Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, South Dakota, Idaho, and Wisconsin being represented.
Many letters are being received telling of the great success these volunteer workers are having. One such volunteer taught 191 women friends something about the art of canning, and she expects to teach more than 500 before the season closes. And what is more this woman has done this work at "odd times" while working in a post office from 6:30 a. m. to 6:30 p. m., with but 30 minutes for lunch.

Will Organize Local Chapter
A number of ladies representing the various societies and clubs of the city met with Mr. Chas. Cather Wednesday morning to talk over plans for the organization of a Red Cross Chapter at this place. It was found that nearly every society in the city was doing some form of relief work, and all seemed willing to unite in one body and organize a chapter. Accordingly a temporary organization was completed with Mrs. D. H. Kaley as chairman, Mrs. J. H. Bailey secretary, Mrs. C. J. Pope corresponding secretary, and Mrs. W. H. Thomas, Treasurer. It was decided to call a big mass meeting for 8 o'clock Monday evening at the Court House to perfect a permanent organization. Everyone interested in doing Red Cross work is urged to be present.

Kansas City Market

Cattle
Kansas City Stock Yards, July 30.—Cattle receipts were 25,000 head today, a big drop from recent Mondays. Prices opened strong to 15 higher, but later slowed down to barely steady, top \$13.75. Hog receipts were 7,500, market mostly 10 higher, top \$16.10. Sheep and lamb supply was 3,000, market weak to 25 lower, best lambs here \$14.50.
Beef Cattle
Missouri beef steers sold at \$13.75, as compared with a top of \$13.93 for best steers here last week. Heavy grass steers were not as numerous today, sales not much changed from the close last week, 15 to 25 below a week ago, best in this class \$12.65. Light grass steers down to \$9. Oklahoma shipped lights, prices around steady, good steers weighing 900 to 1000 lbs. at \$9.10 to \$9.75, 750 to 850 lbs. at \$7.50 to \$9.75, lighter steers down to \$6.75. Butcher cattle opened with good prospects but lost their advantage. Striking switchmen at Chicago threw the market off its stride, and the reported settlement of the strike this morning did not quite restore the equilibrium.
Stockers and Feeders
There was a large hold over from last week, 9000 head, but more country buyers appeared today, and this in connection with receipts smaller than heretofore resulted in a steady market, at recent declines. Some good red Kansas steers sold early at \$8.50, weighing 875 lbs., considered steady. Stock steers range from \$6.25 to \$8.50, including best quality. Some fleshy steers are going out as high as \$11.75, but this trade is not yet dependable.

Hogs
Excited markets closed last week, and buyers asked a quarter higher at the start today. Later the situation settled to a 10 higher basis, with that advance gone at the close. Prime heavy weights sold at \$16.10, highest price since May, medium weights \$16. best lights \$15.60. Dry weaners and two dollar corn are too much for somersers, and a certain number of good breed sows are being sacrificed. One Nebraska owner sent on his herd of 12 registered sows. Courageous farmers are able to get broad sows worth the money from timid owners now, one Kansas man today telling of his purchase of two good bred sows, weighing 300 lbs. each, at \$30 a piece at his home last week.

Articles of Incorporation

We, the undersigned, incorporators, do hereby in pursuance of the Statutes of Nebraska, in such cases made and provided, associate ourselves together as a body politic and corporate in the manner and for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.
Article 1—The said corporation shall be named and known as **Riverton-Inavale Light and Power Company.**
Article 2—That its principal place of business shall be the City of Red Cloud, Webster County, Nebraska.
Article 3—The general nature of the business which may be transacted by said corporation shall be as follows:
To acquire land and construct, maintain and operate an electric transmission line or lines over the public highway in said county or counties, to purchase electric current, and to sell said electric current to any person or corporation along the line of said transmission lines; to issue stock, bonds, or a mortgage or other legal evidences of indebtedness, and to do such other things as are necessary in the transaction of the business above defined.
Article 4—The amount of authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000.00). The amount of bonds said Company may issue shall not exceed Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000.00).
Article 5—The existence of said corporation shall commence when said articles of incorporation are filed with the Secretary of State and County Clerk of said County, and are published according to law, and shall continue for forty (40) years unless sooner terminated by due process of law.
Article 6—The greatest amount of liability to which said corporation may at any one time be subject shall not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock of said Company.
Article 7—The capital stock of said Company shall be divided into 400 shares of Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) each.
Article 8—The affairs of said corporation shall be conducted by the Board of five directors, who shall hold such positions for a period of one year from the completion of the said organization of said incorporation, and annually thereafter said Board of directors shall be elected by the stockholders present, among their number as shall be approved by the by-laws of said corporation, hereafter to be adopted by said Board of Directors. The Board of directors shall choose a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and said Secretary and Treasurer may be the same person. Said directors shall perform all of the duties required in establishing and conducting the business affairs of said Company and as provided by the by-laws of the corporation. Said officers shall each hold his official position for a period of one year unless removed by said Board of Directors or otherwise.
Article 9—The place of meeting of the said Board of Directors shall be at Red Cloud, Webster County, Nebraska, unless otherwise ordered by the Board of Directors holding said offices from year to year. The said directors shall as soon as convenient after the formation of said incorporation elect said officers at a meeting to be held in Red Cloud, Nebraska, and provide for the opening of stock subscription books and for the transaction of the business affairs of said corporation, provide the necessary seal and record book, which shall be in the form to be determined by the said directors. Vacancies in the Board of directors during the first year of the corporate existence shall be filled by the then holding directors, and thereafter vacancies shall be filled by the said stockholders in the manner provided by law and the by-laws of this corporation.
Article 10—These articles of incorporation may be amended at any time. Every amendment thereto shall first be approved by a majority of the holding Board of Directors, and upon being approved it shall be entered at large upon the records of the Board, to be accurately kept by the Secretary. Each of such amendments shall be made a part of the articles of incorporation and shall be acknowledged as the record, and public and recorded in the same manner as these articles.
