Kansas City Market

Kansas City Stock Yards, Aug. 20.—Cattle receipts were 30,000 head today, market 10 to 25 lower, more in some cases, nothing prime included. Hog receipts were 6,000 head, market 50 higher, nothing choice included, best here \$19.20, but good hogs weighing above 225 lbs. would go at \$19.40. Sheep supply was 2000, market 25 lower, some lambs weighing 62 lbs. and not fat at the top \$15.75. Beef Cattle Weakness set in last Thursday at noon on all kinds except prime finished cattle, which are scarce, and would sell today about as high as any time. An outside buyer was "today" looking for prime heifers, willing to pay \$13 but the best he could find was some good grass heifers, for which he paid \$9.75, steady with last week. Other grass heifers at \$9.75, and some heavy cows at \$8.75 were called 50 cents lower than last week. The best pasture steers here brought \$11.75, and lower grades of weighty grass steers sold down to \$9, light Oklahomas to \$7. These cattle are 50 to 75 cents lower than best time last week. Idaho killing steers weighing 890 to 970 lbs. sold today at \$9, Oregon cows, 948 lbs., at \$8.50, Oregon steers at \$11.25 to \$12.50. Chicago had 29,000 today, with expectation of only 20,000, St. Louis 12,500, St. Joseph 4,600, too many for the capacity at their market. Heavy declines are reported from each of these markets. Stockers and Feeders Prices declined 50 cents after Tuesday last week, and quit somewhat lower than end of previous week. The market is 10 to 25 lower today and this week should prove a good time to buy. Stock steers range from \$8.75 to \$9, feeders \$8.50 to \$10, fleshy steers for feeding much easier to get away from the packers than heretofore, at \$10.50 to \$11.50. Hogs Top hogs sold at \$19.20 today, as compared with a top of \$17.35 one week ago. At that, the top price today did not represent the real market, for good hogs would have brought \$19.40, more than two dollars advance in a week. The market is 50 cents higher today, and there seems to be no stopping it till it runs past twenty cents a pound some little distance. Demand for pork for soldiers at the front, puts no restrictions on the prices. Aside from the small receipts, quality is lacking and weights are light to an extent that is alarming, in view of probable future requirements for pork products.

Whole Wheat Bread

Utilization of the entire wheat berry in making flour is urged in Emergency Bulletin No. 18, "Whole Wheat Breads," just published by the agricultural extension service of the University of Nebraska. It points out that 27 per cent of the wheat berry is fed to livestock, as the mills utilize only 73 per cent in the making of patent white flour. The use of the hard gristmill in grinding whole wheat for family consumption is suggested in this bulletin. It will be sent free upon application to the Extension Service, College of Agriculture, University Farm.

Articles of Incorporation

We, the undersigned, incorporators, do hereby in pursuance of the Statutes of Nebraska in such cases made and provided, associate ourselves together as a body politic and corporate in the manner and for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.
Article 1—The said corporation shall be named and known as **Riverton-Inavale Light and Power Company**.
Article 2—That its principal place of business shall be the City of Red Cloud, Webster County, Nebraska.
Article 3—The general nature of the business which may be transacted by said corporation shall be as follows:
To acquire land and construct, maintain and operate an electric transmission line or lines over the public highway in said county or counties, to purchase electric current, and to sell electric current to any person or corporation along the line of said transmission lines to issue stock, bonds, or a mortgage or other legal evidences of indebtedness, and to do such other things as are necessary in the transaction of the business above defined.
Article 4—The amount of authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000.00). The amount of bonds said Company may issue shall not exceed Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000.00).
Article 5—The existence of said corporation shall commence when said articles of incorporation are filed with the Secretary of State and County Clerk of said County, and are published according to law, and shall continue for forty (40) years unless sooner terminated by due process of law.
Article 6—The greatest amount of liability to which said corporation may at any one time be subject shall not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock of said Company.
Article 7—The capital stock of said Company shall be divided into 400 shares of Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) each.
Article 8—The affairs of said corporation shall be conducted by the Board of five directors, who shall hold such positions for a period of one year from the completion of the said organization of said incorporation, and annually thereafter said Board of directors shall be elected by the stockholders from among their number as shall be approved by the by-laws of said corporation, hereafter to be adopted by said Board of Directors. The Board of directors shall choose a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and said Secretary and Treasurer may be the same person. Said directors shall perform all of the duties required in establishing and conducting the business affairs of said company and as provided by the by-laws of the corporation. Said officers shall each hold his official position for a period of one year unless removed by said Board of Directors or otherwise.
Article 9—The place of meeting of the said Board of Directors shall be at Red Cloud, Webster County, Nebraska, unless otherwise ordered by the Board of Directors holding said offices from year to year. The said directors shall as soon as convenient after the formation of said incorporation elect said officers at a meeting to be held in Red Cloud, Nebraska, and provide for the opening of stock subscription books and for the transaction of the business affairs of said corporation, provide the necessary seal and record book, which shall be in the form to be determined by the said directors. Vacancies in the Board of directors during the first year of the corporate existence shall be filled by the then holding directors, and thereafter vacancies shall be filled by the said stockholders in the manner provided by law and the by-laws of this corporation.
Article 10—These articles of incorporation may be amended at any time. Every amendment thereto shall first be approved by a majority of the holding Board of Directors, and upon being approved it shall be entered at large upon the records of the Board to be accurately kept by the Secretary. Each of such amendments shall be made a part of the articles of incorporation and shall be acknowledged as the record, and public and recorded in the same manner as these articles.
