**The Schools for 1917-18**

The schools will open Monday, Sept. 10, and inasmuch as several changes in arrangement from previous years will be necessary I am taking occasion to make some statements relative to the beginning of our school.

Registrations for high school work can be made at the high school office on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 7 and 8. Many pupils are already registered. Those not appear until the opening day.

The new building not being ready the necessary arrangements for classes until that time will be announced later. A further statement regarding these matters will appear in next week's paper.

It is sincerely hoped by all connected with the school and by the citizens of Red Cloud that the eighth grade graduates in the territory belonging to Red Cloud will all be with us this year, as we anticipate that the arrangement of the junior high school will be very much to their liking and needs. We are anticipating a very large enrollment of non-resident pupils in addition to the eighth grade graduates as with our new building we shall be able to amply accommodate all who come. We shall be more than pleased to see all our young people in school, even though they may have been obliged to stay out of school for one or more years. The high school schedule offers courses in agriculture with laboratory studies, normal training with practice teaching, commercial subjects including shorthand and type-writing and college entrance subjects.

So even though a young lady or gentleman may have been out of school for considerable time, our school will offer them work well suited to their needs.

A number of inquiries have come to the office for non-resident pupils in regard to rooms and conveniences to offer will confer a favor by informing the office.

**Kansas City Market**

Kansas City Stock Yards, Aug. 27.—Cattle received today 20,000 head, market strong to 20 higher, top steers \$15 a new high record. Hogs today 5,000, market steady with last Friday, top \$18.80, 30 cents above top reported from Chicago. Sheep and lambs to day 5,000, market steady, lambs to killers \$16.50.

**Beef Cattle**

Choice natives sold steady, top \$15, heavy grass cattle 10 to 20 higher, with a good demand for fleshy feeders, who outbid packers on several lots and got them at \$12.85 to \$13.25, packers paying up to \$13.20 for others. Light weight grass cattle sold 15 to 25 higher, medium weight Kansas and Oklahoma steers at \$9 to \$10.50, light Oklahoma steers at \$6.75 to \$8.75, some at the latter price considered 25 higher. Cows and heifers remained dull till the close last week, but are selling better today, at \$6.50 to \$10 for cows, choice fed heifers quotable up to \$13, veal calves \$12.50. Kansas and Oklahoma owners are holding cattle back, as grass is as good now as it ordinarily is in May.

**Stockers and Feeders**

Buyers were in larger attendance last week, and cleared up the yards close. Good fall pastures are stimulating trade in stock cattle, and good corn prospects are inducing the purchase of feeding steers. Stock steers sell mainly at \$7.25 to \$8.50, feeding steers \$8 to \$10, fleshy feeders upwards to \$13.25 today, stock cows and heifers \$6.25 to \$8.

**Hogs**

The top price today, \$17.80, was paid for hogs weighing 240 lbs., other medium weight hogs at \$17.75, and choice heavy hogs worth as much, though none were here today. Best lights sold at \$17.25, and bulk of sales was at \$16.50 to \$17.50. Receipts are so light that very little attention is paid to outside markets, top here recently frequently being a quarter above top in Chicago, including today, and far above other river markets. The hog market is in an uncertain position, and buyers at shipping points are having to do some tall guessing to come out even. However, most of the foam was removed last week, and more stable markets are looked for this week, with strength dominating the situation.
