The people of Red Cloud appreciate the soldier boys who are going to the defense of the country. This morning at 9 o'clock the parents and other citizens met at the court house and escorted the boys to the depot and showed them that we are mindful of their sacrifice for the country.

Many Answer Final Call

On Saturday evening James Oliver Sutton, who resides south of Inavale, stopped at his brother John Sutton's place to get some gasoline for his car. He went into the garage with a lighted lantern which ignited gasoline that had leaked out of a barrel.

Considerable gasoline was burning on the floor of the garage and he and his brother were endeavoring to extinguish the flames and prevent them from reaching the house the barrel of gas exploded striking James. A physician was summoned and did everything possible to relieve the sufferings of the injured man. He passed away at an early hour Sunday morning.

Funeral services were held at the home of John Sutton at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Beebe in charge, after which interment was made in Walnut Creek cemetery.

The young man was 27 years and 10 months of age and leaves to mourn a wife and three children, a father, two brothers and four sisters along with a large number of friends.
