SCORING BUTTER

Individual judgments of the same sample of butter may vary considerably. It is important that the butter judge should become familiar with the quality of butter as required by our standard markets, and then judge the butter according to the demands of the market, rather than according to personal likes and dislikes. The chief thing in scoring butter is to become thoroughly familiar with the ideal flavor of butter, then by repeated comparisons of the different samples of butter, keeping this one ideal flavor in mind, one will soon become proficient in grading butter.
