 The work must be entered before five o'clock. All work from rural schools may be entered the Saturday before (Nov. 3) at the office of the County Superintendent.

GENERAL DIRECTIONS:
 Mount school work on cards 22 inches by 28 inches, the long dimensions of the card board to be exhibited in a vertical position. Mark on the back of the card board the class and number of the exhibit for which the work is entered. Mark the district number, the number of grades in the school and the number of pupils in the school. In mounting the work, paste on the top edge only, and write near the bottom and on the underside of the piece of work the name, age and grade of the child.

Judging—The exhibit will be judged upon the arrangement, general appearance, quality, variety and educational value of the work. The judges will also take into consideration whether or not the work is representative of the whole school or only a few of the pupils.

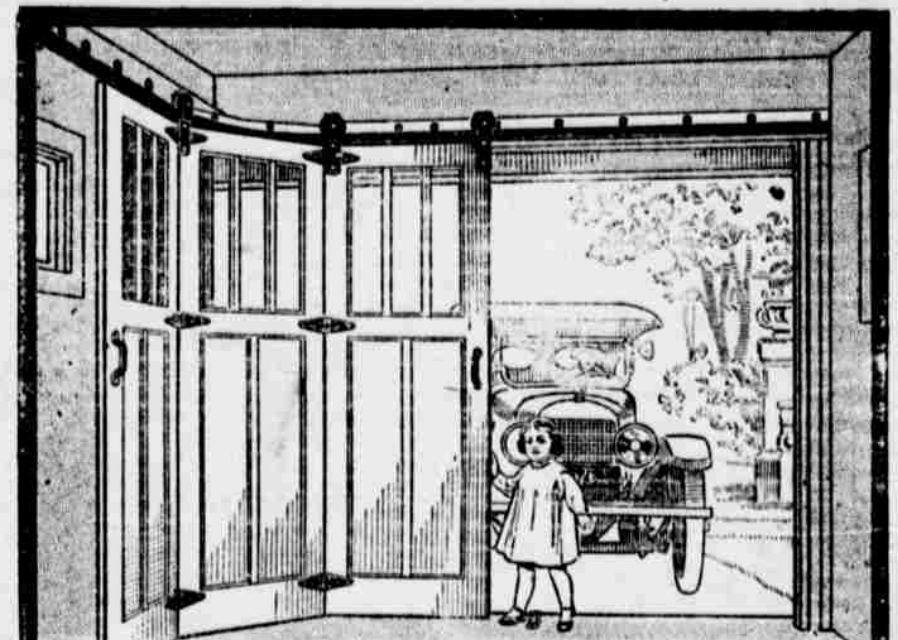
