Red Cloud Again Defeated

Red Cloud was again defeated by Burr Oak last Friday by a score of 25 to 12. The boys lined up at 3:30 p. m. with Burr Oak receiving, and started in to play football but were caught up when Burr Oak made a touchdown on a fake around right end. They failed to kick goal making the score 6 to 0 in favor of Burr Oak. Red Cloud again kicked to Burr Oak, who after several attempts to plunge the line or make gains on end runs, lost the ball. Then our boys started on their march and Burr Oak tried vainly to stop them, but with no result. They marched straight to the goal for a touchdown with R. Newhouse carrying the ball. Pulsipher failed to kick goal, making the score 6 to 6 when time was called for the first quarter.

At the beginning of the second quarter Red Cloud again kicked to Burr Oak, who after several attempts to make a touchdown, dropped one over the goal, which netted them three points more. During this time Prevost at center was hurt and had to be removed from the game and H. Gilbert put in his place.

This time Burr Oak kicked to Red Cloud who were making good gains, when one of their passes was caught by their opponents, who got away for a touchdown. They kicked goal making the score 16 to 6 in favor of Burr Oak. On again kicking to Red Cloud, who started passing the ball, it was caught by a Burr Oak player who got away for another touchdown, but failed to kick goal making the score 22 to 6. In this quarter Kaley at left end was with drawn and Pope put in his place. Neither side scored the rest of the quarter.

At the beginning of the second half several changes were made in the line-up, P. Newhouse going in at left full and R. Pope at right half. H. Blackledge was put on left end and Pulsipher in right tackle.

Burr Oak kicked to Red Cloud at the starting of the second half. Red Cloud began to play football and was determined to cut down Burr Oak's lead. They pulled several good plays and finally by hammering the line Pulsipher went over for a touchdown. Pulsipher failed to kick goal making the score 22 to 12 in favor of Burr Oak.

Neither side scored the rest of the quarter although Red Cloud got well down in the enemies territory several times.

At the beginning of the last quarter Red Cloud kicked to Burr Oak, who by end runs and forward passes managed to get near Red Cloud's goal line. That was as far as they could go though and they finally dropped one over the goal, which counted them three more points, making the final score of 25 to 12 in favor of Burr Oak.

Neither side scored the rest of the game and when it was ended it was Red Cloud's ball on Burr Oak's thirty yard line.

The boys are not down hearted though, because they were playing half subs and they get another chance at them on Thanksgiving at Red Cloud. So the attendants will see a game well worth seeing. The boys are all coming back in fine condition and it is hoped that Prevost will be with the team next Friday when they go to Cambridge to get an opportunity at the State Championship.
