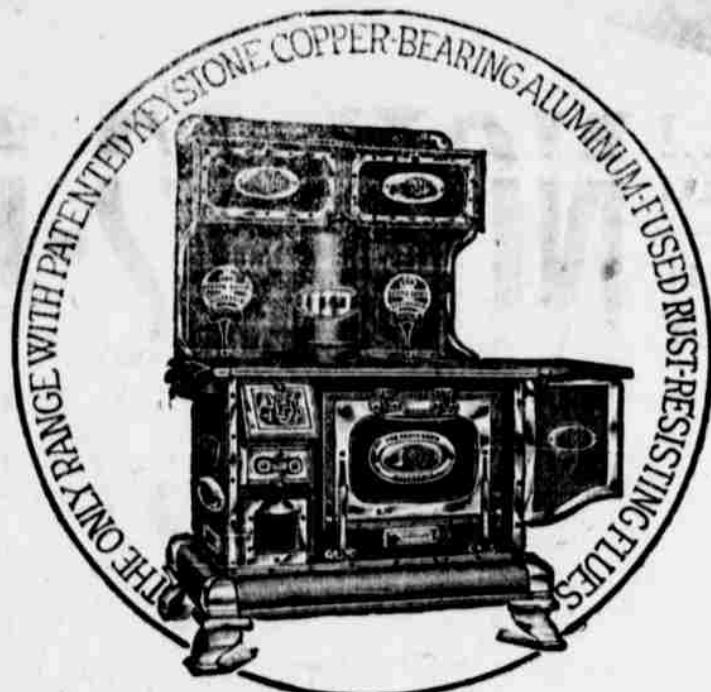

Reply to Lincoln Phone Company.

The people of this community have been aroused the last week by the letter published in the local papers addressed to Mr. O. E. Ramey and signed by one L. E. Hurtz, who calls himself General Manager of the Lincoln Phone Company. This letter is a plea for consolidation of the two companies and at the same time intimates that resort to the federal courts will be made for the protection of property if it seems to be necessary—yet at the same time it brazenly proposes matrimony between the Lincoln and the Independent Phone Companies.

Past experience does not warrant such a consolidation. The Independent Company once had a toll line through to Hastings, but by sinister influence was later deprived of this privilege and later given a toll connection with the local Lincoln switchboard and a twenty-five year contract for toll service.

Recently without any provocation on the part of the Independent Company toll connections were severed and further service refused, notwithstanding the fact that seventeen years service on this contract is still due the Independent Company.

If past contracts are to be violated without just cause, consolidation might endanger the entire Independent system.

If the Lincoln Phone Company is so anxious to serve all the people why did they refuse to call a physician when the wife of one of our citizens was seriously ill, yes at death's door? This citizen, not having a phone in his home and not wishing to leave his sick wife alone while he went in search of a physician, called one over his neighbor's Bell phone. On learning that he was not one of the Company's patrons he was refused the service of the Bell Company's wires to summon the physician. If the Bell Company will refuse to serve the people in a case of life and death will they serve the people in social and ordinary business matters?

Is it not a fact that on last election day the Lincoln Company allowed a local politician to use their system to

deceive the voters of Bladen by his using of a local minister's name? Is it not a fact that the said company has not been willing to apprehend the criminal?

I am not financially or otherwise interested in the Independent Company except as a business man, subscriber and citizen, and I most heartily commend the Independent Company for their plans to enlarge and improve their service. They are capable of running their own business and I urge them to avoid any consolidation scheme.

The Road Petition of Clyde Pitney and others in regard to location of new road between sections 26 and 27 township 2, range 12, was taken up and after discussion by the Board it was decided to take no action in this matter until the next meeting of the Board.

Moved by Shidler and seconded by Knigge that Geo. H. Overing be appointed to act as County Highway Commissioner for Webster county until the first regular meeting of the Board in January 1918. Motion carried.

Bond of Geo. H. Overing as County Highway Commissioner approved.

Motion made and carried that the salary of the County Surveyor be \$50 per year.
