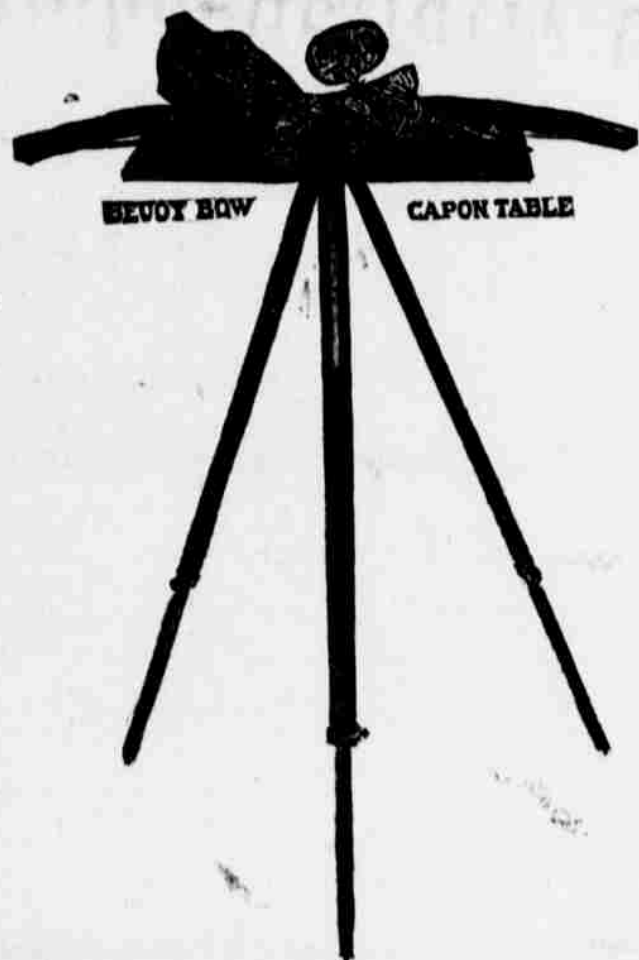

In accordance with rulings of the Postoffice Department Postmaster Letson announces that after December 1st a tax will be placed upon all parcel post packages. On a package subject to 25 cents postage a tax of one cent will be charged. On parcels on which the postage amounts to from 26 to 50 cents the tax will be 2 cents. Parcels will not be accepted unless both the postage and the tax are prepaid. Also that on all parcels addressed to the forces in France the weight limit will be 7 pounds.

Notice of Incorporation
