Farmers Meet in Omaha To Consider Soft Corn

To consider the question of soft corn in the state, a meeting of farmers has been called in Omaha on November 30. Arthur Schultz of Scribner is taking the initiative in calling the meeting. Reports from the various parts of the state are that much corn is soft; that much of it is being cribbed too soon, and a consequent loss to the state is being manifested. What to do with the corn is the main question to be discussed and action will follow by this voluntary body of men. Preliminary advices have been to see that the corn is not cribbed before it is thoroughly cured; and in the event it has been cribbed to immediately begin feeding it. Such advice is being given by the Agricultural Extension Department of the University and by state farmers' organizations. The meeting will be held at the Hotel Rome.
