Each county head will immediately appoint an executive committee consisting of representatives from all parts of the county. The first duty of the administrator will be to fix prices on certain food commodities for the county. These prices will be fair prices and will be the householders' guide in determining whether they are paying a fair price for the necessities

Mr. Wattles gave his county administrators wide latitude in carrying out the provisions of the Federal Food Act. He also urged them to hold county-wide meetings and many of them, emphasizing the needs of voluntary coorperation of every true blooded American.


