Mill Feeds Classified

In order to standardize the grades of wheat mill feeds in Nebraska and to get uniform feeds to purchasers in the state, G. W. Wattles, federal food administrator for Nebraska announces the following grades, which Nebraska mills may manufacture. The classifications include four strictly mill feeds and two screenings combinations. Red Dog, a standard before the new milling regulations went into effect, is eliminated. Millers must follow these classifications:

WHEAT BRAN is the coarse, outer coating of the wheat berry obtained in milling wheat that has been scoured and cleaned. It must contain a minimum of 14.5% of protein, 3.5% fat, and not more than 11% fibre.

BROWN SHORTS or standard millings are the fine particles of the outer and inner brand separated from bran and white middlings. It must contain 16% minimum protein, 3.5% minimum fat, and not more than 8% fibre.

MIXED FEED or mill run bran is a mixture of all the products, other than flour. It must contain not less than 16% protein, 3.5% fat minimum and not more than 9% fibre.

FLOUR MIDDINGS or gray shorts are that part between brown shorts and low grade flour and must contain a minimum of 14.5% protein, minimum 3.5% fat and not more than 3.5% fibre.

SCREENINGS may be combined with either wheat bran or mixed feeds and must carry the same ratios of elements entering into the feed.

"Violations of these gradings will mean censure before the federal food administration for Nebraska," says Mr. Wattles.

On and after April 14, all commercial bakers will have to use substitutes in all products from the bakeries. Heretofore it has been optional, except in baking bread and rolls. The federal food administrator announces that not less than the following amount of substitutes must be used: Bread and rolls, 25%; crackers 15%;

sookies and ice cream cones 33 1-3%; pies and cakes 33 1-3%; fried cakes 33 1-3%; pastries 33 1-3%; batter cakes, waffles and quick breads 33 2-3%. "Violations of these rules will result in immediate suspension of the license," says Food Administrator Wattles.

Hens Should not be Hurried to Market

"A rush of too many fowls to market as soon as the restriction against selling laying hens is removed may result in food losses, says the U. S. department of agriculture. "Think twice before selling a hen that is still laying. Green feed is becoming more plentiful and the demand for eggs continues. Universal marketing of fowls may react on prices as well as cause spoilage of dressed poultry."

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
