Using Gas Masks

Camp Funston, April 21, 1918. Monday morning the regiment went to Carpenter Hill, where we spent the morning digging dugouts and drainage ditches in the trenches. In the afternoon we spent the time practicing with a .22 rifle and setting sights.

Tuesday the regiment went to the rifle range north of Ft Riley, where we spent the day shooting on the 100 and 200 yard range.

Wednesday morning we went out to the drill grounds where we spent the morning drilling and while marching in at noon had to wear our gas masks for a few minutes. Wherever we go now while drilling we have to carry our gas masks in order to get used to carrying and wearing them.

Thursday the regiment went out to Smokey Hill Flats, where they spent the day attending Division school.

Friday morning it started to rain and rained all day and we had to stay in the barracks and had instruction lessons. In the evening the 2nd battalion assembled in the dining room of Company H's barracks, where we heard a lecture on the Third Liberty Loan Bond by a Lieutenant.

Friday night it quit raining and started to snow and kept it up all day Saturday and we had indoor instruction all day.

The camp is taking on a good appearance and everything green. Trees are being set out everywhere and in a few years the Camp will be well shaded. The roads which were not completed last fall are being finished now.
