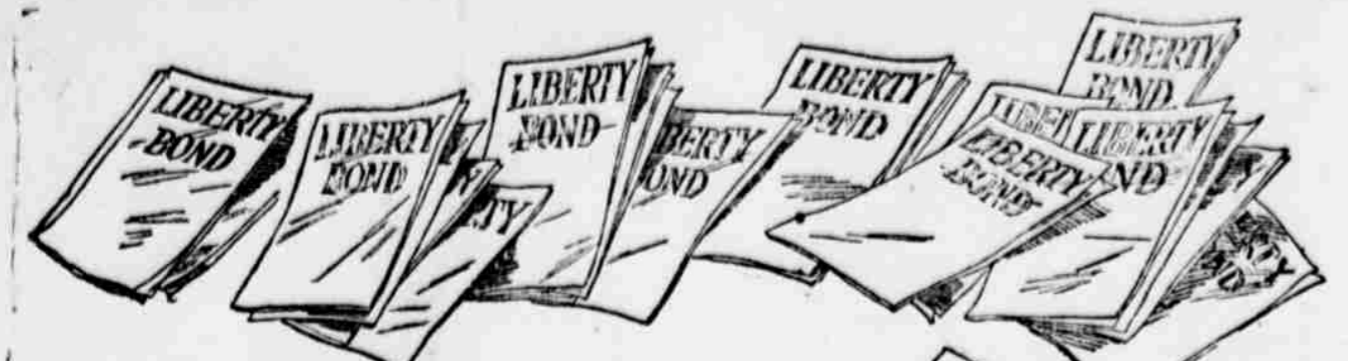

The Tourists Triangle Tour

Note the Burlington map and its three Western trunk lines:
 (1) NEBRASKA-BILLINGS, GLACIER PARK.
 (2) NEBRASKA-DENVER-COLORADO, WEST.
 (3) DENVER-BILLINGS-YELLOWSTONE, NORTH
 Note the geographical triangle formed by these Burlington lines and what a comprehensive northwest tour they offer,—ONE WAY via Denver, Scenic Colorado; ONE WAY via Rocky Mountain National (Estes) Park,—with 700 miles of mountain panorama, from Denver to the Yellowstone, and to Glacier Park, the climax of the Rockies' rugged grandeur; ONE WAY along side the Big Horns and the Black Hills. Boys and Girls Pig Club Project.
 The County Agent will try and organize Four Boys and Girls Pig Clubs in Webster county.
 They will be known as the following: Bladen Club, Red Cloud Club, Cowles Club, and the Guide Rock Club.
 Boys and Girls may join the Club nearest them. Membership blanks may be had from the teacher, or at the County Agent office.
 To each member will be furnished a record book, record blank, and information on the care of pigs.
 Each member will begin the project by having one or more pigs weighed.
 A pure-bred pig is recommended, altho not necessary.
 Each member must feed and care for one or more pigs for at least four months, beginning before the pigs are twelve weeks old. Each member must begin to feed his pig on or before July 1, 1918.
 A club leader will be appointed for each of the four towns. Arrangements will be made so that the members of the Red Cloud Club can exhibit their pigs at the Red Cloud Farmers Institute. Members of the Bladen Club at the Bladen Fair. Members of the Cowles Club at the Cowles Farmers Institute, and members of the Guide Rock Club can exhibit at the Guide Rock Farmers Institute.
 Suitable awards will be given in each club. These will be announced later. In making club awards, the economy of gain, the reports, the story of the project, and the individual merit of the pig will be taken into
