Holyoke, Colo., May 18—B. S. Boyce, a farmer, and I. C. B. Wood, his former hired man, fought a pistol duel late yesterday afternoon ten miles south-east of Holyoke in which both are reported to have been wounded, the latter perhaps fatally.

Four months ago Boyce and his wife were living happily together on a farm in Franklin county, Nebraska. Boyce sold the farm, turning the money over to his wife.

Shortly after Boyce left, his wife and Wood came to this section and Mrs. Boyce bought a ranch ten miles southeast of Holyoke, employing Wood as manager.

When Boyce returned to his former home in Nebraska and discovered that his wife had disappeared, he began searching for her. Finally, thru a canceled bank check, which the woman used in paying for the Colorado ranch, he discovered her whereabouts.

Boyce came to Holyoke with his attorney and effected a financial settlement with his wife, who it is said, refused to return to her husband.

Three weeks ago Wood was mysteriously wounded. He declared it was an accident. About that time Boyce was seen in the vicinity of his wife's farm. Neighbors advised Wood to leave the district.

Boyce and two friends suddenly appeared at his wife's farm yesterday afternoon in an automobile. Boyce, armed, sought Wood, who also carried a gun. The men emptied their guns at each other, being only a few rods apart.

It is reported here that Boyce, although badly wounded, strapped his opponent hand and foot and brought him by auto, a long drive, back to the neighborhood of Riverton with the purpose of wrecking summary vengeance; that the sheriff got wind of the affair and arrived in time to break up this part of the program and put the principals under arrest.

Articles of Incorporation

The Inavale Independent Telephone Company

Know all men by these presents: That we, the undersigned, have associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation under the laws of the State of Nebraska, and for that purpose do hereby adopt these articles of incorporation.

The name of this Company shall be, "The Inavale Independent Telephone Company."

The principal place of transacting

the business of this corporation shall be Inavale, Nebraska.

The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation shall be the constructing, buying, owning, leasing, acquiring, operating and selling telegraph and telephone lines or lines, and their interest in the central office in the city of Inavale, Nebraska, and the surrounding country, and other places in the State of Nebraska and adjoining states, the making of exchange and exchange agreements with other lines or companies, and in general to carry on for hire the business of transmission of news and messages, local and long distance, for its members, patrons and the public in general, and to acquire, hold and dispose of such property, real or personal, as may be deemed expedient in the conduct of the business.

The amount of capital stock of this corporation shall be the sum of \$100,000.00, divided in shares of \$10.00 each to be issued one share to each signer of the preliminary corporation agreement for each phone share now held by them respectively in the original association known as the Inavale Independent Telephone Company, and the remaining portion to be treasury stock, to be disposed of for the benefit of the Company, as the Directors may determine; and each share when issued shall entitle the owner to one vote at all stockholders' meetings; said stock shall be fully paid up when issued, and shall be non-assessable except as may be voted by a majority of the stock present, and entitled to vote. The stock shall be transferrable only on the books of the Company, and no Real Estate Franchise, or material portion of personal property, of the Company, needed for the transaction of its business, shall be sold, leased or transferred, except by the consent of three-fourths of the stockholders of stock issued and outstanding, which consent may be given at any stockholders meeting, or in writing and for which both the votes and written consent of stockholders not voting may be counted. No stockholder shall hold in any way to exceed five shares.

The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be on the First day of January, 1918, and it shall continue during the period of fifty years.

The highest amount of indebtedness to which this corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not be more than \$4000.00.

The business of said corporation shall be conducted by a board of directors, not to exceed seven in number, who shall be elected annually by and from the stock holders; such election to take place at such time and be conducted in such manner as shall be prescribed by the by-laws.

The officers of said corporation shall be a president, secretary and treasurer, to be chosen from and by the directors and shall hold their office for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

The board of directors shall provide a corporate seal on which shall be engraved the name of the Company and date of incorporation, with which all instruments of the Company shall be authenticated.

There shall be held at the principal place of business of the Company, annually, on the Second Tuesday of January of each year, a meeting of the stockholders of the Company, and the manner of conducting the same, the election of officers, and the method of conducting the business of the corporation shall be as provided by the by-laws adopted by the Board of Directors. Special meetings of the stockholders may be called when deemed necessary by order of the Board of Directors, and notice thereof shall be by the secretary mailing a written notice to each stockholder at least seven days before said meeting is to be held.
