

Mechanics Needed

1. According to a statement made by Major Mark L. Ireland, Quartermaster Corps, U. S. A., who is in command of the extensive automobile repair shops at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, the great need in the present war is motor transportation and the greatest problem arising in connection with motor transportation is to keep it available at all times for service.

2. The repair shops at Fort Sam Houston are designated by the war department to take care of the motor transportation south of Kansas and west of the Missouri, which means that the great number of motor driven vehicles involved in service within the confines of the territory mentioned are dependent upon the repair shops at Fort Sam Houston for overhauls.

3. The education and training of men for this class of service with the army is one of the principal factors of the shops located at Fort Sam Houston. Adequate instruction is given the men to qualify for service with mechanical units for service in this country and abroad. A large percentage of Americans in this section of the country are somewhat surprised to know that such an organization exists at Fort Sam Houston, where men are daily being received for training in the particular duties connected with motors and motor transportation.

5. Captain Ned Horton, Q. M. R. C., Executive officer of Quartermaster Mechanical Repair Shop, No. 394, at Fort Sam Houston, who is well-known in and about the Brownsville district, when interviewed stated that the opportunities open to men for service in this shop are beyond comprehension of civilians. While it is well known that the Navy has had in operation training schools for a number of years past, the army has never before operated training institutions such as the one in existence at Fort Sam Houston, for the reason that the requirements of the army in the past have been adequately met by adjunctive departments attached to corps or regiments.

6. The government has been extremely generous in the apportionment of non-commissioned grades, and a large percentage of the officers now serving with the shops have been promoted to commissioned officers from the ranks of enlisted personnel.

Any man, whether in the draft age or otherwise, who has had experience along the lines above indicated, is requested to write without delay to the Commanding Officer of Quartermaster Mechanics Repair Shop No. 394, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, who will furnish full particulars concerning pay, government allowances, and other subject matter indicating opportunities that are open to men possessing qualifications making them desirable for duty with this organization.

Produce Infertile Eggs

Now is the time that has been suggested as the date to confine or segregate the male bird from the flock if he is of no value as a breeder. Dispose of him on the market or else can him by the cold-pack method. The date has been taken from the poultry questionnaire cards that have been sent out to the poultry raisers of the state.

The reason for doing this is to produce infertile eggs as there is a loss in the state of Nebraska of 23 per cent of the eggs laid during the summer months, that are unfit for human consumption. The fertile eggs will germinate at a temperature above 68 degrees, thus spoiling the eggs for market purposes, especially during the summer months when the temperature gets around 99 and 100 degrees, it does not take long for the fertile egg to spoil, whereas the infertile egg can stand a temperature of 103 degrees without deterioration.

After taking the male birds away from the flocks the eggs will be fertile for at least ten days or two weeks and will allow you to hatch chicks out until the last week in June, for summer and fall flocks. Do not be misled by the idea that it is necessary to keep the male birds with the flock to increase egg production.

Collect your eggs twice a day. Keep them in a cool place away from contaminating odors.

Keep your nests clean and the litter on your floor clean and your eggs will be clean.

Provide one nest for every four hens. Market your eggs at least twice a week.

By producing infertile eggs you are doing your bit toward increasing the supply of food stuffs.

Articles of Incorporation OF The Inavale Independent Telephone Company

Know all men by these presents: That we, the undersigned, have associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation under the laws of the State of Nebraska, and for that purpose do hereby adopt these articles of incorporation.

The name of this Company shall be, "The Inavale Independent Telephone Company."

The principal place of transacting the business of this corporation shall be Inavale, Nebraska.

The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation shall be the constructing, buying, owning, leasing, acquiring, operating and selling telegraph and telephone line or lines, and their interest in the central office in the city of Inavale, Nebraska, and the surrounding country, and other places in the State of Nebraska and adjoining states, the making of exchange and exchange agreements with other lines or companies, and in general to carry on for hire the business of transmission of news and messages, local and long distance, for its members, patrons and the public in general, and to acquire, hold and dispose of such property, real or personal, as may be deemed expedient in the conduct of the business.

The amount of capital stock of this corporation shall be the sum of \$10,000.00, divided in shares of \$10.00 each to be issued one share to each signer of the preliminary corporation agreement for each phone share now held by them respectively in the original association known as the Inavale Independent Telephone Company, and the remaining portion to be treasury stock, to be disposed of for the benefit of the Company, as the Directors may determine; and each share when issued shall entitle the owner to one vote at all stock holders' meetings; said stock shall be fully paid up when issued, and shall be non-assessable except as may be voted by a majority of the stock present and entitled to vote. 
