Last Thursday evening, in Red Cloud where she had resided for many years, this aged lady passed onward to her final reward. Those who look beyond the borders of the sky see her reunited with her soldier-husband and their four children—all of whom long since preceded her in death.

She was a native of Wisconsin and was seventy-six years of age on the 13th of last March. Her maiden name was Jane Nelson and her first move from home was to Michigan where she met and married Thomas Younglove, later a soldier in the Civil War, who died in the early seventies.

The children were, Horatio, Francis, Cynthia and Mary. Only the latter lived to maturity. She became Mrs. Rosecrans, the mother of Mrs. Daisie Aubushon, the only surviving granddaughter, who, with her four children, Bertha, Lester, Ray and Clifford, mourn the departure of Grandma Younglove from their home.

Mrs. Younglove was a truly Christian woman, having been a member of the church of Disciples for twenty years; a woman who will live long in the memory of many friends.

Funeral services were held in the Christian church Saturday at one o'clock; sermon by Rev. J. L. Beebe, pastor. Interment in Red Cloud cemetery.
