Death of A. F. Tanquary

A. F. Tanquary, an aged and respected resident of this community for many years, died Tuesday of this week at the home of his grandson, James Tanquary, in Red Cloud, of the infirmities of age, among which a recent stroke of paralysis counted prominently. The remains were brought to Bloomington, and the funeral was held here Thursday, in the afternoon, being conducted by Rev. Hivner, and the aged man was followed to his last resting place in the cemetery here by a large number of his old friends and neighbors.

Mr. Tanquary was born in Frederick county, Virginia, July 26, 1832, and was 85 years, 10 months and 21 days of age at the time of his death. He was married to Elizabeth Fox on Dec. 25, 1853. A son by this marriage preceded him Oct. 6th, 1867. His wife departed this life July 17, 1856. Mr. Tanquary was again married Dec. 28, 1855, to Nancy Fox, and to this union one child was born, Horace N. Tanquary, who preceded his father April 24, 1896; his wife, Nancy, died Feb. 14, 1894. The deceased came to Franklin county in March, 1885, and here he has resided almost continuously since, until the last month, when he went to Red Cloud to be with his grandson, and where he passed away.

He leaves two grandsons, James and Will, and eight grandchildren. He has been a long and useful life. —Franklin County Tribune.
