REFUSED SUFFRAGE

SENATE REFUSES PRESIDENT'S PERSONAL APPEAL

FAILS OF MAJORITY BY TWO

Wilson's Address Failed to Change the Views of Senate From Earlier Line-Up

Washington.—The senate refused to grant the request of the president that the women suffrage resolution be passed as a war measure.

After five days of debate, corridor conferences and cloak room negotiations, the Susan B. Anthony federal amendment resolution enacted by the house last January received on the final roll call two votes less than the necessary two-thirds majority. Fifty-four senators were recorded for it and 30 against it with 12 absent and paired.

Before the vote was announced, Senator Jones of New Mexico, chairman of the woman suffrage committee to comply with parliamentary requirements, changed his vote from the affirmative to the negative and moved that the senate reconsider. This made the final official record 53 to 31 and left the resolution technically pending on the senate calendar, in position for further consideration planned after the November elections, when suffrage forces hope to muster the requisite number of votes.

President Wilson's personal address to the senate supplemented by letters to several democratic senators opposed to the resolution did not change a single vote although in the final debate some senators asserted that defeat of the resolution would mean repudiation of the executive. Including the absent and paired senators, the roll call showed that the senate line up of 62 to 34 on the resolution remained virtually unchanged from the beginning of the fight.

Allies Enter St. Quentin

Paris.—St. Quentin, upon which the Germans had so firmly build their hopes of proving an insuperable barrier to the allies, at last has been entered by the French and seemingly the gateway is open to Marshal Foch for a swift advance eastward in his task of reclaiming northern France. Meanwhile the Germans and their allies on all the battle fronts have continued to play a losing game and it is reported that the Turks realizing the critical situation through successive defeats and the withdrawal of Bulgaria from the war are sending out "peace feelers." From northern Belgium to the region of Verdun the battle front is still seething with activity and with the entente forces continuing to make gains against the Germans which are seriously imperiling the enemy lines.

Daniels Wants a Sea Fight

New York.—"My most fervent prayer is that as Pershing's army goes into Berlin, those German battleships will come out of their hiding place and give the allied navies a chance for a fight," declared Josephus Daniels in an address here at the semi-centennial celebration of the New York Athletic club. "But let us not think that the way to Berlin will be easy," he added. "It is quite possible that we will pay heavy toll. Let us reconsecrate ourselves to the past and determine to make every sacrifice and accept no peace until the American nation has been vindicated—until the American army has wedged its way to the heart of Berlin."

Deserting the Sinking Ship

London.—Frederich von Payer, German imperial vice chancellor, has resigned, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Central News. From Amsterdam comes also confirmation of the reports that Chancellor von Hertling and Foreign Secretary von Hintze have tendered their resignations to the emperor. Emperor William has addressed the following to Count von Hertling: "Your excellency has reported to me that you no longer find yourself in a position to remain at the head of the government. I will not hide from myself your reasons and must with heavy heart deny myself your further co-operation."

New York.—Twenty sailors from a naval vessel in the harbor were drowned by the capsizing of a naval tender in which they were returning to their ship. Eleven other men were rescued. None of the bodies of the dead have been found. A heavy sea was running and the boat was dashed against a large buoy anchored several hundred yards from the warship.

Ferdinand Goes to Vienna

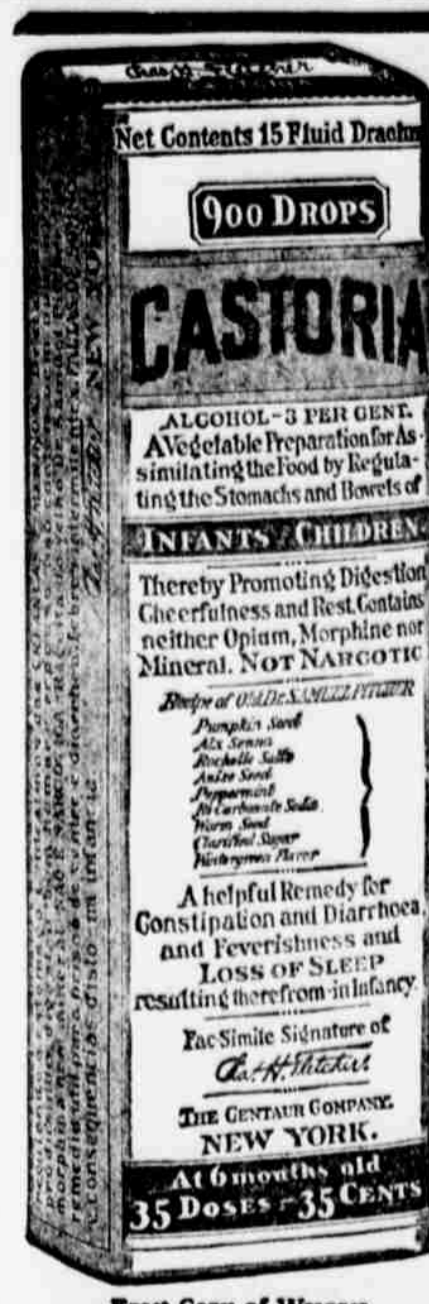
Copenhagen.—King Ferdinand of Bulgaria has arrived at Esenthal Castle, outside Vienna, according to the Frankfurter Zeitung. This is the first news that Ferdinand has again left Bulgaria. It may mean that the reported revolutionary movement in his country is gaining ground.

Record Made in Lottery

Washington.—Breaking all records for speed, America's third and greatest draft lottery was completed in twenty hours. Working in shifts throughout the night, the officers in charge reached a speed of eighteen numbers listed every minute in the closing hours.

Basel.—Cholera has broken out in Berlin, according to advices received here. There have been seven cases of which six were fatal

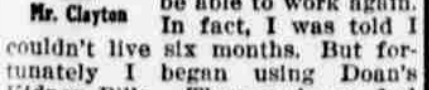
