Symptoms of Common Cold

- 1. Onset—Not so sudden; usually passes through a warning stage.
2. Chills and Fever—Chilliness rather than definite chills; fever not so marked or absent; so-called inward fever.
3. Prostration—Not so profound; merely a general weakness, just a general "good-for-nothing" feeling.
4. Coryza—Comes on gradually, preceded by a dry stage lasting a few hours to several days.
5. Sore Throat—Usually an early symptom, especially if tonsils are diseased. May begin with slight tonsillar soreness.
6. Headache—Not so profound; eyes not so affected; usually in forehead or to back of the nose. Not always present. May be general.
7. Backache—Not usually present—only a feeling of weakness in back.
8. Pain in the legs—Not usually present.
9. Pain in the Bones—The bones do not especially ache in colds.
10. Temperature—Fever absent or runs low; usually comes on more gradually and runs from 99 to 101 degrees.
11. Sputum—Not characteristic; may vary in color and form—yellow, white or mixed.
12. Lung complications—Lungs often involved. Lung complications appear later. The third stage of a cold.
13. Nervous Symptoms—Not so prominent as a rule, not so profound. Patient often rests and sleeps well if nose is not completely stopped up.
14. Colds may be contracted at any time; they are more local, although they run through a family or a school.
15. Sequelae—Recovery from a single attack is more or less complete. More largely affects the nose, throat, lungs or the sinuses. Repeated attacks usually required to produce serious after-effects.

Symptoms of Spanish Influenza

- 1. Onset—Sudden, without warning or previous hint. Strikes as by an unseen hand.
2. Chills and Fever—Definite chills and marked fever. More or less sudden appearance of both.
3. Prostration—Profound, sudden and continued, out of proportion to the other symptoms.
4. Coryza—Water discharge begins at once, little or no recognizable dry stage preceding appearance.
5. Sore throat—Not such a constant symptom, unless complicated by tonsillitis. General soreness or diffuse redness.
6. Headache—Usually severe, often in the eyes or at the back of the head; hard to control; often described as a "splitting headache."
7. Backache—Nearly always present; severe, characteristic.
8. Pain in the legs—Usually marked and severe.
9. Pain in the bones—A characteristic pain of influenza.
10. Temperature—Fever high for several days—from 100 to 105 degrees or even 100 degrees in severe cases.
11. Sputum—Usually a characteristic greenish yellow, containing many coin-like lumps.
12. Lung complications—Lungs usually involved. Severe complications often make early appearance.
13. Nervous Symptoms—Very marked. In some forms resembling meningitis. Patient usually restless and sleepless. In severe cases, delirium.
14. Influenza travels more in epidemics, although it is ever present with us. It runs through a town or a nation.
15. Sequelae—Leaves its victims prostrated. Is followed by lung, kidney, heart and nervous diseases. Results of a single attack may be lifelong. Patient usually remains weakened two or three weeks.

Spanish Influenza Precautions

- 1. Keep in mind that like most contagious disease, influenza is spread by contact, that is, by the transfer of the poison from one person to another. It is spread by sneezing, coughing and spitting, at which times the discharges from the nose and throat are scattered in the air.
2. When sneezing or coughing place your handkerchief before your nose and mouth.
3. Make sure that you are properly clothed, in accordance with the varying changes in temperature prevalent at this time of the year.
4. Fresh air is always good. Keep your bedroom windows wide open, and secure as much sleep as possible.
5. Keep the digestive organs in good condition.
6. Drink water freely.
7. Avoid common drinking cups, common towels and similar utensils.
8. Wash your hands frequently.
9. Use a mild antiseptic as a nose spray or as a mouth gargle, especially if your throat is sore or there is a tendency to sneezing.
10. If you have a "cold" use disinfectants for your personal use exclusively, or if you are in contact with one so affected, be careful not to use the utensils handled by them.
11. Consult the family physician at the first onset of symptoms suggestive of influenza.
12. Spread this information as much as possible in newspapers, picture shows, schoolhouses, churches, etc.—F. G. Pernoud, Medical Adviser Southwestern Division American Red Cross.

- 1. Every pledge made to the people has been fully and faithfully redeemed.

10. The State Hail Insurance law has been administered in an efficient and businesslike manner, and all losses sustained by policy holders during the past season will be paid in full. No other State selling hail insurance has ever paid 100 per cent of its losses.
11. The Seed Analysis Branch of the Pure Food Department has, during Governor Neville's administration, made more than 5,000 seed tests, without cost to the farmers of Nebraska.
12. Being advised that there was a shortage of hog cholera serum and virus, and that Nebraska hog raisers were experiencing difficulty in securing prompt delivery of the product, Governor Neville recommended to the Regents of the State University, that the state serum plant be reopened. The Regents acted favorably upon the Governor's recommendation, and immediately directed the reopening of the plant.
13. Prohibition has been energetically enforced throughout the State. There have been 4,527 prosecutions and fines have been assessed amounting to \$125,000.00.
14. He was born and reared in Nebraska, and understands the needs of the people.
15. It is unwise to change horses in the middle of a stream.
Nebraska has excelled all other states in many phases of war work endeavor. The re-election of Nebraska's war governor will mean a continuation of effective co-operation in this work.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 6th, A. D. 1918:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage" and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Approved, April 9, 1918.
