Not one of us but knows of some son of German born parents who is in the ranks shoulder to shoulder with our American boys. And that there are a vast number of German-born citizens who are just as true Americans as our own native people. In the roselate light of a dawning peace let it be remembered that the birthright title of German is not in itself cause for condemnation. Thousands of these people know now and thousands more will realize that America's part in the world war is for the benefit of the fatherland. Ours is not a war for conquest but for liberty and enlightenment. Every German-born American has relatives or friends over there who will benefit beyond measure when the final settlement comes.

Our esteemed republican contemporary the Advertiser displays a noticeable streak of Missouriianism—a desire to be shown—in a recent issue. Time and space are inadequate to the task in its entirety but with desire to accommodate we essay a few items. The Federal Reserve banking system inaugurated by the present administration has stood the test of the heaviest strain ever put upon a financial institution and is a peerless example of governmental success in public activities. Wilson "Kept us out of war" until the time came when entry into the war was a necessity—was demanded—and competent critics do say that he "kept us out of war" too long—then he organized, launched and has carried well nigh to successful termination the greatest war activity recorded in all history. For this the world commends him. For this a million voices shouted praise a few weeks ago in New York City. For this the freed people of Belgium weep tears of joy. Arguing that republican control of Congress will place a check upon expenditures the Advertiser implies extravagance and files charge of colossal war cost "twice as high as it is any where else." The absurdity of these misleading assertions is plainly evident upon comparison of per capita figures which show that among six leading nations in war the United States is highest in national wealth and lowest in national debt. Latest available figures, compiled during the present month, give the per capita standing as follows:

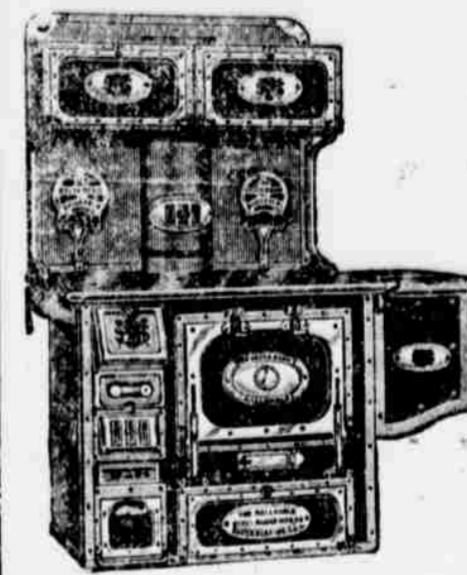
