Office of County Judge

In the matter of fees and salary, the excess fees paid into the county treasury for the year 1917 was \$311.20, and this year the excess fees earned by the office, to be returned to the county at the end of the year, will be more than the allowance of the county commissioners for clerk hire, and the office of county judge will be self-sustaining for the first time in its history, without the expenditure of ONE CENT RAISED BY TAXATION.

It is my intention to leave this matter of clerk hire just where the statute places it in the sound discretion of the County Commissioners, and they will not make any allowance for clerk hire, unless it is shown to be necessary to the efficient business management of the office, and in no event would such allowance be in excess of the fees earned by the office.

I have been a resident of Webster County for 46 years, was admitted to practice law in 1880, and continued in that profession until elected county judge. Since that time I have retired entirely from the practice of law and have not engaged in business of any character whatever outside the duties of the office, and I now ask for an appropriation of the rate and support of the electors of Webster county, in any regard to their political affiliation, and if elected I pledge to devote my entire time in the faithful performance of the duties of the county judge.
