Obituary

Mrs. Phoebe C. Burdley Daisley was born in Farmington, Illinois, February 21, 1851, and died at the Mary Leominster Memorial Hospital, Chicago, Nebraska, October 15, 1918, aged 67 years, 7 months and 22 days.

When a small child she removed with her parents to Ottumwa, Iowa, and from there in 1877, they came to Red Cloud, since which time she has resided continuously in Webster County. Her father and mother were among the first settlers in this county. Her mother, Mrs. Mary Burdley, still lives at Red Cloud. Her father having been called home in 1904.

She was united in marriage to Howard Daisley, of Red Cloud, Neb., July 4, 1883, and for several years they lived in and near Red Cloud. In 1891 they moved on a farm near Inavale and later they took up their residence in town where they have resided ever since.

To their union was born nine children, seven daughters and two sons, all of whom are still living except Elizabeth, both of whom preceded her mother to the eternal home, Feb. 12, 1901. The living are, Mrs. Stella Kennedy, Mrs. Maude Kennedy and Samuel Howard of Inavale, Neb.; Mrs. Dora Hill of Phillips, Neb.; Mrs. Phoebe Phinney of Houston, Texas; Mrs. Pearl Smith of Levellon, Neb.; and Hoyt and Ella, who are still in the home.

Mrs. Daisley united with the Christian church some years ago and lived a faithful and consistent life dying in the triumphs of Christian faith. She was a member of the Royal Neighbor and Degree of Honor lodges and was active in many other benevolent and Christian organizations in the community, and will be sadly missed. We cannot help but mourn her loss though we are glad to have been blessed with her life. Her character was expressed in deeds rather than words, and her life is measured in service not in years. She was ready when the sun came to fold her tired hands and go home to rest.

Our sky is overcast with clouds and the path of life seems full of shadows. Let us trust the power that has led us thus far to lead us on over moon and fen o'er crag and torrent till the night is gone and the angel face again shall smile, which we have loved long since and lost awhile.

Mrs. Daisley leaves a husband, eight children, ten grand-children, two brothers and a sister besides her aged mother and a host of friends and relatives to mourn her loss.

Funeral services were conducted in the Christian church by her pastor the Rev. A. S. Reeves, of Guide Rock, and a great concourse of relatives and friends were present. Beautiful and impressive music was furnished by a quartet composed of C. E. Joyce, Eustace Bean, Mrs. C. A. Waldo, Mrs. T. Hedin. There were many beautiful floral offerings from the lodges the church and from friends. Interment was made in the Red Cloud cemetery.

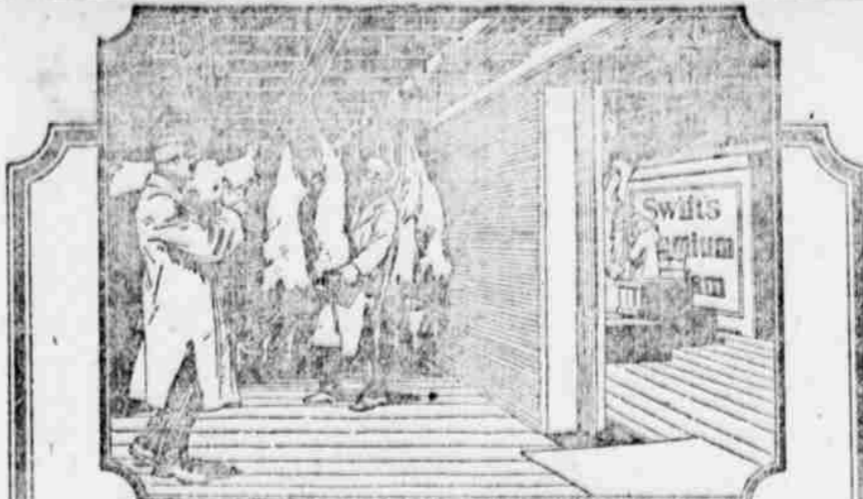

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the following proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
