TO THE VOTERS OF WEBSTER COUNTY:

I am a candidate for re-election as County Attorney. You can best judge of my fitness for this office by my past conduct of the office.

I have endeavored at all times to make the office efficient and to hold the expenses down to the lowest point consistent with good service.

The following complaints have been filed during the past two years:

Drunkenness 21	Forgery 5	Burglary 2	Larceny 12

This makes a total of 79 cases

There has been about \$333 in fines alone collected from these cases for the county and costs of about \$475.00. Besides these fines and costs some defendants have been sentenced and in others fines were imposed and laid out. Some defendants were paroled.

These fines collected for the county greatly exceed all other costs paid out by the county in all other prosecutions. Thus making the office more than self-sustaining in the matter of prosecutions.

Since the new prohibition law went into effect on May 1, 1917, I have prosecuted 27 cases for bootlegging, possession of liquor and drunkenness. Of these 27 cases in every case that came to hearing the defendant was fined. In a few cases the fine was suspended by the court. In these cases there were \$640.00 in fines alone collected besides costs.

The tax case of Webster County vs C. B. & Q. Railroad Company was won in the Supreme Court of Nebraska for the county.

During my term nothing has been paid by the county for other legal services.

I regret that the central committee of the honorable opposing political party saw fit to make a personal allusion to my candidacy in letters recently mailed over the county as I think in a local election that personalities are out of place. However this committee is mistaken, for

The county attorney has important duties that require the attention of some one attorney.

I have been a resident of southwestern Nebraska most of my life and am a graduate of the Nebraska College of law and also the University of Nebraska. I am married and have three children.

"The president appeals to the national spirit. It is difficult to overestimate the supreme importance of sustaining the president."—Senator Penrose.

"The war (Spanish American war) came while the republican administration was in power and must now be settled by that administration. What he (the president) wants is the support of the house of representatives."—Senator Foraker.

"The only way to secure continued unity of command in America is to return a congress in full sympathy with the president."—Secretary McAdoo.
