I regret that I have been able to personally see few of the people of this county as practically all of my time is occupied by my school duties. I am therefore compelled to appeal to the voters thru the county press.

The schools of Webster County should be the best they can be made. I believe the child should be at home under the parents immediate observation instead of being thrown upon his own responsibility during his characteristic learning period.

The ninth and tenth grades can be taught in the home school at less dollar cost than the room, board and other school expenses of the same children in the city schools.

I notice the farmers are paying good wages and are tempting teachers from the town schools into the country. Good teachers are a good investment no matter what is paid them. You cannot afford to trust the training of your children's minds to cheap teachers. Good schools and good churches mean brighter children with increased earning capacity and sturdier character.

I should like to see each grade doing the same work as the corresponding grades of all the other schools so that a child could move from one to another and be able to keep along with his work without loss of time.

Our schools, already very good, may be maintained at their highest standard. If the oversight of them falls into my hands, I shall seek the cooperation of the school officials and parents and shall welcome any good suggestions they may offer. I shall meet and expect the help of the County teachers.

A good education does not make a good man, yet there is no good man but is the better for a good education, and the money and time spent in school is, without doubt most wisely spent.

I have lived most of my life among you. I was educated here. I graduated at your State University of Nebraska and I have carried on considerable work at the University since graduating. I also did normal work during two summer schools. I was chosen by one of the teachers of the University of Nebr., to teach in their model school for the benefit of the teachers there for summer normal work. I have taught successfully a good many years in Red Cloud and in larger towns. Many of the teachers in the county have been my students and are my friends. I feel I am well acquainted with the schools and their needs in this part of Nebr. I have had a professional life certificate for most of my teaching experience.

I earnestly ask for your vote in this election and pledge all my energies to the progress of your schools in the case of my election.
