To The Loyal People of The Fifth Congressional District.

Mr. Andrews, my opponent, is making frantic attempts to develop a partisan fight over the campaign in this congressional district rather than a spirit of American unity in support of the President in the gravest hour that has ever confronted the American people.

His political advertisements consist largely of charges, criticism and attempted detraction of my record in Congress. I don't believe the people of this district care for political back wash when the Nation's life is at stake. I refer to the only two matters that he mentions that are of any moment at this time. He complains of the tariff under which the railroads were taken over by the Government for war purposes. What all well informed people know is that the Government did not buy the railroads, it leased them. To have paid them less would have amounted to confiscation that far and would have resulted in an immediate appeal to the courts.

He tells the people I voted for the bill reported by the Military Committee providing for \$25 per month for the soldier, but he does not tell them that the existing law already provided for 20 per cent additional pay for foreign service so that under the bill as reported every soldier who crossed the sea would receive \$30 per month and that it was supported by the Republican as well as Democratic membership of the Committee and the War Department as well.

President Wilson has so handled the great problem growing out of the world war that he commands the admiration and the confidence of the entire world. The American Army and Navy under his matchless direction has already compelled the enemy to practically admit his defeat and victory and permanent peace are close at hand. America must show it stands unitedly behind the President in this the greatest hour of American history.

I make no partisan appeal for my own election. I know that the Republican National Committee and Mr. Andrews are adding that I be defeated for purely party and personal reasons. Mr. Andrews has made one of his seasonal visits to this District in the homes that he once won in office. The grain harvest of my home State and the epidemic of influenza has prevented me making any speeches to the voters of the District. But I shall let the President of the United States speak for me. In the solemn appeal which he has made to the American people in his published statement he gives the over mastering reason for my reelection. I consider it the greatest moment of my life when he asks the people whom I have the honor to represent in the American Congress to reelect me that he may have my support rather than the constant opposition of my opponent.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL  
AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:  
Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby be amended by striking out the following words:  
"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:  
"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
