County Farm Bureau Notes

Farmers having corn that was mature before the freeze should save all the good ears for seed. There will be a good demand for good corn from counties that were hit by the drought.

Farmers in this county needing seed corn should secure their supply this fall and get it as close to home as possible. If the farmers having extra seed corn to sell will notify the County Agent he will assist them in selling it.

Farmers wanting to buy seed corn we will be glad to try and locate same for you. Last spring the county agent placed over 200 bushels of seed corn, 200 bushels of this was placed outside the county.

The dates of the Red Cloud Farmers' Institute will be December 10-13. The same program and premium list will be carried out as previously arranged.

The Board of Directors of the Webster County Farm Bureau met Saturday afternoon and appointed a co-operator in each school district in the county. There are 75 school districts in the county. The co-operators will be commissioned by the Governor. Their names will appear next week in the Farm Bureau notes.
