A letter received from M. K. Quigley states he was on his way to Denver where his wife's married sister, (we presume this to be Mrs. Carl Lassasso), had died from the prevailing epidemic. He also states that Mrs. Quigley, who has been staying with her relatives there is very sick with the same disease. Mrs. Quigley has two brothers Joseph and John and an unmarried sister, Theresa Gavin, who reside in Denver. The latter will be remembered by many Red Cloud people as a visitor at the Quigley home all last spring.

The Scrivner's Sorrow

The Scrivner family again comes under the shadow of death, this time Valley Scrivner, well known former resident of Red Cloud, and sister of Cash H. Scrivner, Mrs. Edith Mountford, Mrs. Laura Barrett, and Mrs. Susie May of this city. She was born at Winston, Mo., Jan. 21, 1881, came to Lebanon, Kan., 1901, thence to Benkelman where death came Dec. 15th, 1918. In addition to those mentioned, three other brothers, Oscar, William, Albert and her father V. H. Scrivner survive.

The remains were brought here Tuesday and funeral services held from her brother's residence Wednesday afternoon, in charge of Rev. John Hammel, pastor of the M. E. church of which church deceased had been a member since 1913. Interment was in Mt. Hope cemetery.

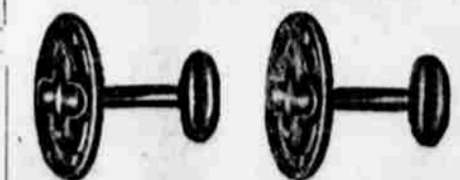
