

The case of Raymond Scott, a boy of about fourteen, who was run over by a Ford touring car, in front of the Bon Ton Bakery a year ago, April 2nd, was tried in the Franklin County District court at Bloomington, last week. Judgment was received for \$350 and costs. Although the doctors, who testified in the case, found injuries that may be permanent, the jury composed mostly of farmers could not see any great amount of injury to the young man. Attorney E. G. Caldwell was attorney for the plaintiff.

It will be remembered that the boy was riding a wheel and had no knowledge of the fact that the car was bearing down upon him, as its driver turned around in the center of the block instead of making the turn at the corner, as specified in city traffic ordinances. The boy was thrown from the wheel, falling on the pavement and two of the wheels of the car passing over his body. That he escaped death is nothing short of a miracle.
