Miss Owen was in charge of the musical program and Miss Helen Lemon held the attention of the audience with her reading, "The Flanders' Field".

The tank was again loaded in the evening and proceeded on its way to Bloomington and other points west.

**Good Roads Now Assured**

The program of road building throughout Nebraska which has made considerable progress is making even greater strides since it has received the 1919 appropriations which will now provide for approximately \$10,000,000 for the construction of 4,200 miles of highway as mapped out by the state engineer.

It is the intention of the state engineer to first build the roads in the most thickly populated districts where traffic is the heaviest and those connecting with the principal highways.

Under the federal road act it is necessary that a survey of the proposed road, with estimates of the cost of work, etc. first be submitted to the federal government, before federal aid can be apportioned or contracts let for the work. The various projects range from 91 miles to 4 miles, in accordance with distance between towns and roads they connect.

Red Cloud—Ayr, 28 miles, is found in the list of projects that have been surveyed and approved by the federal government, on which estimates for bids will be made in its turn.

**Junior Farmers Meet May 26**

L. I. Frisbie, state club leader announces that May 26 to 30, will be Junior farmers' week, the annual gathering of boys' and girls' clubs. Fifty-two boys and girls have already been awarded free trips to Lincoln among them being Bert Norris and Clayton Ailes of Red Cloud. Eight canning teams, composed of three persons each, will attend.

Any other boy or girl who completed a project, agriculture or home economics, last year, or who are working on such projects this year may attend by paying \$7 to partly cover their expenses.

The mornings of the week will be devoted to instructions at the university farm. The afternoons will be spent in industrial tours of the city, visiting various commercial concerns.

**Chickens Are Profitable**

The chicken is no longer looked upon, by the farmer, as a necessary nuisance around the barn yard or the idol of some city man's capricious fancy. It is now playing an important part in the matter of dollars and cents in the farmers bank account. During the summer months the chicken rustles its own living, requiring little or no attention after reaching the age of a few months, and before Mr. Farmer realizes, that it has passed the chick stage it is in condition to market as a "fry". Once an egg producer, the chicken proves to be a source of regular income for the farmer. No doubt two of our rural neighbors, Messrs Hugh McPartland and Chas. Phares consider the hen a money maker, as one day last week they brought to the Farmers Union seventy two dozen (each) eggs for which they received thirty-five cents a dozen, of better than \$25 for their efforts. Figure this as a weekly occurrence and you will realize that the chicken is paying its way on the farm.
