Congregational Church Notes

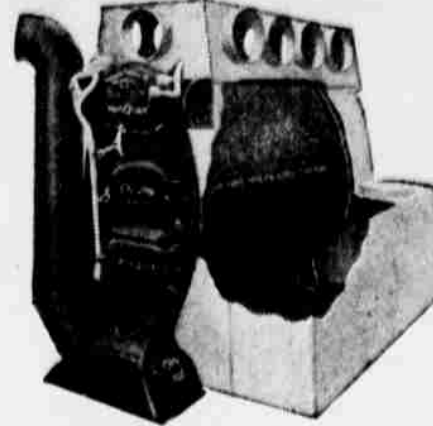
Owing to the death of a sister of Mr. King, living at Muscatine, Iowa, he was unable to keep his appointment here last Sunday.
