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BAPTIST INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE
During the Baptist State Convention at Grand Island, April 26 to May 1, our State Secretary Ray E. York received a telegram urging him to come at once to the International Conference. Mr. York having oversight of all missionary and financial activities of the denomination in the state, conducted through the State Board, it seemed that Mr. York's presence was indispensable but we realized the gravity of the situation and felt the great Baptist denomination should take part in the conference and help solve some of the world wide problems of the hour. After daily considering the matter the Convention voted unanimously to send Mr. York to the Conference and he left at once.
We give a copy of two telegrams from Mr. York and forwarded by Mrs. York to Rev. Harper which will fully explain themselves:
"Presented personally in writing five strong recommendations concerning denominational Union Federation to pastors group today noon. Four were adopted unanimously and presented to the International Church Board. This will act tomorrow. If adopted by them the Baptist's interests are safeguarded."
