The inconsistency of things that occur sometimes sets one to thinking, and one should not be too willing to condemn our fellow men when their opinions differ from ours. One of the city officials refused his consent to the payment of the account, claiming that twenty some odd thousand dollars was entirely too much damages for a broken leg, in as much as he had two legs broken (in a city too) and was only allowed the trifling sum of seventy-five cents each for the legs. His case seemed a good one, too, as he had sufficient evidence to convince any jury that the legs had been broken. The evidence was a "bad order" freight bill and the legs were those of a washing machine.

Several residents in the vicinity of the Washington School have called our attention to the scenery around this building. A little jaunt over this section convinced us that they certainly have a kick coming. The first object of horror that met our gaze was a huge pile of ashes and cinders--in all probability the remnants of last winter's supply of furnace coal. The finishing touches was added to this bit of scenery by having it surrounded by a boundary strip of weeds and grass that have almost reached the height of young trees. In all probability the grass on the entire lot has not felt the touch of a lawnmower for many weeks. To have this district surrounded by such a growth of undesirable shrubbery shows a lack of civic pride upon the part of our school board and we do hope that they will take the hint and see that they are removed and not compel the residents of this district to endure this sight or have to remove them themselves.

The Board of Education are experiencing no little difficulty in securing a complete staff of teachers, for the coming school year, apparently due to the fact that the said teachers find other fields, than this, more remunerative. Miss Mable Popp, principal of the High School, has tendered her resignation and will go to Sheridan, Wyoming, at a considerable advance in salary. A few weeks ago the Board contracted with a 21 year old graduate of the Kansas State University, for the coming term, at a salary of \$95.00 per, only to be called up a few evenings previous by the young lady, in person, with the request that she be released from her contract in order to accept a similar position at Mankato, Kansas, at a salary of \$110.00. At present vacancies are found in both English and Science instructors as well as the Kindergarten.--Commercial Advertiser.
