than of war. A problem of how to have all of the people patriotic, all of the time; ignorance and illiteracy to combat; enforced knowledge of the English language in every school and the intelligent use of the American ballot.

By special request the afternoon band program was repeated. It proved to be the big musical feature of the entire week. All of the old soldiers were guests of honor at both the afternoon and evening entertainments.

Tuesday afternoon the Mathison Concert Company, featuring Christian Mathisen, the great Norwegian tenor, Ignatius Tello, noted Brazilian Violinist, Jaenette Booher, soprano and Marguerite Poindexter, reader and accompanist, played to a large enthusiastic audience.

The same musical company rendered a pleasing program the same evening, which included a part of the grand opera, "The Bohemian Girl."

This was followed by a lecture by Dr. Jas. T. Nichols, a noted world traveler. As he had been one of the fortunate ones who had gained admission to the Peace Conference he was qualified to give the people considerable information regarding what had taken place there. He told of the favorable impression that our President made with the French people, both officials and citizens; the peace table, 30 feet long, surrounded by 84 men from 27 nations, representing 1,200,000,000 people. Every man that rose to speak paid tribute to President Wilson. He also laid great stress on the proposed League of Nations; that it was looked upon favorably by every foreign country and was not opposed by those who gave their sons to fight for the cause of freedom. It seems to be the only thing that will prevent a repetition of this last great struggle.

The sixth day, Wednesday, brought The Henrys and Dr. D. D. Vaughan. The Henrys, with their program of magic and mystery, made a decided hit with the audience. Humorous crayon sketches and beautiful landscapes in colored sands. It was a different class of entertainment than is usually found on Chautauqua programs.

Dr. Vaughan comes to us a national character. He is pastor of the Halsted Street International Church of Chicago. The good he has accomplished in the slums of this great city has made him a great favorite with the people. He had a very forceful message, on his subject, "American Ideals," the four principal ideals being Truth, Liberty and Equality and Service.
