## Farmers to Keep Books

The State Bankers' Association thousands of farm record books produced by the University Department of Rural Economics will be distributed over the State for the calendar year beginning January 1. Ten thousand of these books were used by farmers this year, and they were declared to be of much value, especially in determining income tax. The book is the result of several years work and investigation by the University and is said to represent the best of its kind so far produced. It is simple and yet complete, providing for a record of all receipts and expenditures, together with a farm inventory at the beginning and end of the year. Then it uses a farmer knows his exact worth and his profit or loss for the year.
