Commercial Club Decides To have Roads Repaired

A regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held in their headquarters in the Kellogg building Tuesday evening. After the meeting had been called to order, the minutes of the previous meeting were read and a number of bills read, approved and ordered paid.

Indoor sports will be on the schedule for the coming months, as the secretary was instructed to order the required amount of decks of playing cards for the use of the members and their guests.

Considerable interest was shown in the discussion of the matter of an area landing, being constructed in Red Cloud for the coming year, the secretary stating that several letters had been received from promoters of this means of transit. The matter will be taken under consideration and taken up again at the next meeting.

The house committee was instructed to draw up a new lease on the present quarters for the coming year, subject to several conditions, one of which was, that sufficient heat was to be provided at all times.

It was decided to give Marshal Phillips a membership in the club gratis; he in turn to see that the non-members of the city were not permitted to use the club room as a lounge place on Sunday and evenings.

F. W. Cowden stated that the farmers residing south of the city had on many occasions brought to his attention the road south of town, also that they were willing to cooperate with the merchants and citizens in placing this road in a condition that would permit travel over it during all seasons of the year. Any one who has found it necessary to travel over this road between this city and the Kansas line knows its condition. It is a matter that requires immediate attention.

A committee composed of Messrs F. W. Cowden, W. L. Wesner, W. G. Hamilton and F. E. Maurer were appointed to see what can be done in the matter.

This being all business that was to be transacted, the meeting adjourned.

Mrs. Newbury Laid to Rest

Julia Upson was born in Wolcott, New Haven county, Connecticut, Dec. 8th, 1836 and died at the home of her brother in law, C. L. Cotting, in this city Sunday, October 12, 1919.

When four years of age she with her parents moved to Bristol, Kenosha county, Wisconsin where she resided until her marriage to John C. Newbury on July 27, 1870 after which they moved to Shiloh, Texas and two years later they made their home at Pilot Point, Texas where she lived until after the death of her husband on February 28th, 1898.

January 20, 1903, she with her son Julius came to Red Cloud and which place has since been her home. She was the mother of several children, three of them dying in infancy. Her son Julius died August 1, 1906 in this city.

Mr. Lee Newbury, of Dallas, Texas, son and only surviving member of the family reached this city last Saturday morning and added great comfort to her during her last hours.

She is also survived by a brother, Salmon E. Upson of Bristol, Wisconsin, and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Marsh of Lisbon, North Dakota and Mrs. Lucy Stonebreaker of this city.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mrs. Mitchell, of Franklin, Tuesday afternoon at the home of her brother-in-law, C. L. Cotting. Interment was made in the city cemetery.

War Risk Insurance

The Bureau of War Risk Insurance wishes to emphasize the importance to service men of one of the provisions of the War Risk Insurance Act upon the fulfillment of which may depend the validity of their claim to compensation under the Act.

The War Risk Insurance Act provides that "No Compensation shall be payable for death or disability which does not occur prior to or within one year after discharge or resignation from the service, except that where, after a medical examination made pursuant to regulations, at the time of discharge or resignation from the service, or within such reasonable time thereafter, not exceeding one year, as may be allowed by regulations, a certificate has been obtained from the director to the effect that the injured person at the time of his discharge or resignation was suffering from injury likely to result in death or disability".

Many discharged men are not familiar with or are inclined to disregard this provision of law and are allowing their rights thereunder to lapse.

Request for the certificate mentioned above should be made to the Chief Medical Advisor, Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Washington, D. C.
