Paper Has But One Subscriber.

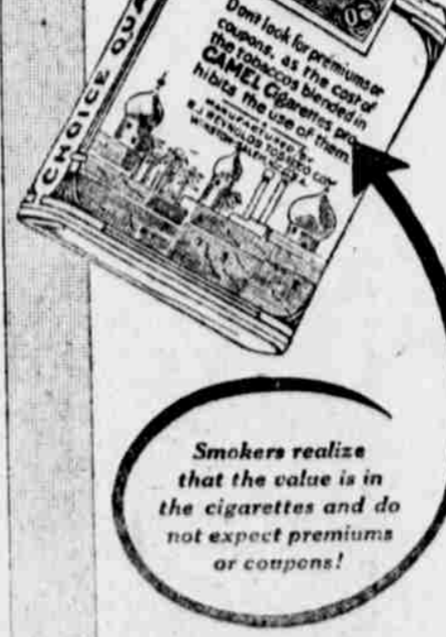
