Angus McIntosh, one of the pioneer residents of this county, passed away at his home in this city Wednesday morning at one o'clock, after an illness of several weeks duration.  
 Mr. McIntosh was born in Scotland, September 1833 and was 86 years old. He moved to Canada sixty years ago where he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Wells, after which they moved to Wisconsin and then later to Iowa. About forty years ago they moved to Webster county and settled on a farm on Indian Creek. About twelve years ago they moved to this city where they have since resided. He was a very industrious and hard working citizen.  
 Nine children were born to his family, two having passed away several years ago. Three sons, James, Peter and Frank, and four daughters, Mrs. Lizzie Rounds, Mrs. Belle Scott, and Mrs. Griminger of Grand Island, and Myrtle McIntosh of Cheyenne Wells, Colorado, and the aged wife are left to mourn his demise.
