Injured in Twelve Foot Fall

Ed Mountford is having an enforced vacation from his duties with the E. W. Stevens plumbing and electrical establishment and is nursing injuries sustained in a fall at Riverton Tuesday. Mr. Mountford was installing a heating plant in a residence in that town and when the job was almost completed found that he was short on material. Wishing to complete the job that night he went to the Hobart hardware store to supply his want. The proprietor, accompanied by Mr. Mountford, went up to the top floor for the required article, using a flash light to light the way. In some manner Ed strayed from the supposed path of safety and stepped into an unguarded opening, falling to the floor below. In the fall he collided with a pump cylinder, the rod striking his leg and inflicting a deep wound. He also received other minor injuries, as well as receiving a severe shaking up, internally. He was later brought home to Red Cloud. At this time he is able to be out, but continues to suffer considerable pain.

Aviator Seeks Landing

A special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held on last Thursday afternoon, to meet and hear Aviator R. M. Cochrane's proposition regarding the proposed aviation landing here. A committee composed of Messrs. A. D. Ranney, F. J. Grice, R. P. Weesner and W. A. Sherwood was appointed to negotiate with Mr. Cochrane regarding the selection of a suitable landing field, the erection of a storage building for the aeroplane in unfavorable weather and the erection of a hangar. Mr. Cochrane is an experienced aviator, having been an instructor in an aerial school during the period of the war. The plane would be used for exhibition flights and commercial purposes should action be taken in the matter and arrangements made for the landing.

Mrs. C. R. Besse Laid to Rest

The death of Mrs. Chas. Besse, Saturday evening, marked the passing of another of the pioneer citizens of Webster county. She was among the first women to venture into this, then unsettled west, coming here in a covered wagon in 1871. For a number of years she patiently endured the privations of the comforts of life in order to assist in tracing the outlines of civilization on the face of the broad and fertile acres of this county. Crop failures, hostile Indians and prowling coyotes failed to break her cheery spirit, later being rewarded for her efforts by seeing broad farms, and busy little cities where once roamed the native Indian.

Mrs. Besse was born in Wyandotte county, Ohio on September 3, 1843. At the age of 24 years she was married to H. S. Kaley, three children being born to this union, one passing to the great beyond in infancy. Charles and Cora (now Mrs. Breerton) survive her. In April 1883 she was united in marriage to Chas. Besse.

During her later years she embraced the teachings of Christian Science and assisted in the organizing of that religious denomination in this city.

The funeral services were conducted from her late home, Monday afternoon with E. J. Overing officiating. As a mark of respect all business in the city was suspended during the funeral services.
