Death Calls Tom Farrell

Brakeman Tom Farrell, one of the oldest employees of the Burlington, who has been running into Red Cloud from St. Joseph died suddenly early Tuesday morning. Shortly after his arrival at the depot, he having walked from the McFarland hotel through deep snow drifts, it was noticed he was in bad shape. A doctor was immediately summoned but Mr. Farrell was in such serious condition that it was impossible to do anything for him. Mr. Farrell had a hard attack of the flu last winter and his health has been bad every since. The remains were taken to St. Joseph on No. 16 Tuesday.

The following trains running thru Red Cloud were discontinued Monday, December 8th: Passenger trains No. 14 and 15 between St. Joseph and Denver and No. 4 and 11 between Red Cloud and Hastings. Business will be handled on the Hastings branch by the freight crew only making a trip to Red Cloud in the morning and back in the afternoon to Hastings. Likewise the passenger trains on the Oberlin and St. Francis branches have been taken off and accommodation trains are handling the business.
