**Air Line Starts in April**

Merrill Dimond has a communication from the Hightower Aerial Transportation company to the effect that it is planning to start its passenger service in April. The company plans to use a 6-passenger plane which will have three 150-horsepower engines which will be so attached and constructed that any one of the three will take the plane to the next landing field. The passenger compartment is to be very comfortably fitted and it is the idea that the trip from Kansas City to Colorado Springs can be made in seven hours. The fare now planned is twice ordinary passenger and pullman rates which would make the trip referred to cost \$50. The landing fields decided upon are said to be Seneca, Marysville, Washington, Mankato, Smith Center, Phillipsburg, Norton, Selden and a number of points in Colorado. This company has spent quite a little money in the project and seems to mean business. It will not be long to wait until the time set for starting the service which may become a reality in the coming year.—Smith County Journal.

**Farm Bureau Notes**

**Economy in Beef Production Comes From Better Blood. Good Herd Bull Is First Step Toward Better Calves.**  
The use of more and better purebred sires is a dependable method of decreasing the cost of rib roasts and beefsteak, because cattle of better blood make more economical and rapid gains than do their scrub-ancestored rivals. Buying a good herd bull is the first step in growing better calves at much less per pound. In common or native cow herds, calves sired by purebred bulls weigh on an average about 125 pounds more a head when one year old than youngsters of the same age sired by the average run of scrub bulls, and they will sell for about 2 cents a pound more as stockers and feeders. Two-year-old steers sired by good purebred bulls weigh on an average about 200 pounds a head more than steers parented by scrub bulls, and sell for about 2 cents a pound more as stockers and feeders.

This difference in price of the two classes of calves and steers applies not simply to the difference in weight, but to the total weight. For instance, in the case of yearlings, scrubs weigh about 300 pounds and sell for about 9 cents a pound, while grades at the same age weigh about 425 pounds and will sell for 11 cents a pound. Two year old scrubs weigh about 525 pounds a head and, valued at 8 cents a pound, will bring \$42 apiece, while grades of equal age weigh about 725 pounds and at 11 cents a pound as stockers and feeders, bring \$87.

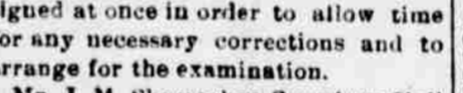
E. E. Spurrier lost another good horse Monday.

**Civil Service Examination**

An open competitive examination under the rules of the U. S. Civil Service Commission for the position of Clerk (Male and Female) in the Post Office Red Cloud, Nebraska, will be held on Saturday, January 10, 1920, commencing at 9 o'clock a. m.  
Applications for this examination must be made on the prescribed form, which, with necessary instructions, may be obtained from the Commission's local representative, Marion Bloom, Secretary Civil Service Board, at the Red Cloud, Nebraska Post Office, or from the undersigned.  
All persons wishing to take this examination should secure blanks and file their applications with the undersigned at once in order to allow time for any necessary corrections and to arrange for the examination.

An Act of Congress, approved July 11, 1919, provides: "That hereafter in making appointments to clerical and other positions in the executive branch of the Government in the District of Columbia or elsewhere preference shall be given to honorably discharged soldiers, sailors and marines, and widows of such, and to the wives of injured soldiers, sailors and marines who themselves are not qualified, but whose wives are qualified to hold such positions."  
Applicants who are entitled to the benefit of this act should attach to their applications their original discharge or a photostat or certified copy thereof or the official record of their service, which will be returned to them after inspection by the Commission.
